Dear Parents and Carers,

Newsletter Issue Dates

- It's tough being editor of such a highly respected publication. With a two-day week next week, there will be an end-of-term Newsletter on Tuesday, but I didn't want to break the printing routine, so today's is a bit briefer and factual. It also means I can write more about Legally Blonde on Tuesday without jinxing the last night tonight. Plus, as you'll see below, I expect that covid advice and guidance might be a bit better on Tuesday than it is today.

Covid: Changes to Official Guidance

- In order to remain impartial, it's probably best if I don't use my own words and quote directly from yesterday's guidance from the Department for Education. These are the new arrangements as from today, Friday 1st April.
- "Children and young people who are unwell and have a high temperature should stay at home and avoid contact with other people. They can go back to school, college or childcare when they no longer have a high temperature, and they are well enough to attend.
- Adults with a positive COVID-19 test result should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for 5 days, which is when they are most infectious. For children and young people aged 18 and under, the advice will be 3 days. *[Which implies we're all going to rush out and buy tests; which none of my local pharmacies have in stock]*
- For education and childcare settings from Friday 1 April:
- Regular asymptomatic testing is no longer recommended in any education or childcare setting, including in SEND, alternative provision and children's social care settings. Therefore, settings will no longer be able to order test kits
- The UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA) will publish new guidance. Most of the specific COVID-19 guidance for education and childcare settings will be withdrawn from GOV.UK on Friday 1 April. The operational guidance on the testing in education settings document sharing platform will also be removed on the same day.
- Please do not hand out any test kits to staff, pupils, or students unless advised by your local health protection team, local authority or director of public health."

Covid: what these changes mean in practice

- If your child is ill, don't send them to school, please.
- If they have covid symptoms, be doubly careful about sending them to school, and please don't if they have any form of raised temperature.
- At time of writing this, I am not sure what the reporting arrangements to the DfE and Devon will be. So, when phoning or e-mailing in notification of absence, please continue to tell us any covid symptoms, when they started, and if this has been confirmed by a test if you have stockpiled any. (Do you remember two years ago the stockpiling of toilet roll and pasta ? How things move on...)

Non-uniform days

- Next Tuesday is NOT a non-uniform day. We have only just had one, and there will be another one for Ukraine on 6th May, combined with some of the fund-raisers which were unavoidably postponed. The next one will be at the end of the summer term.

UNICEF

- Mentioning Ukraine, we received a letter from UNICEF which included the following:

“Thank you for your generous donation of £1520. You've enabled us to protect children in danger in Ukraine when they need us most. No child should have to see their homes damaged and their lives torn apart. Yet, as the crisis rapidly escalates, that is the situation facing 7.5 million children in Ukraine.

YOU HAVE MADE A DIFFERENCE TO CHILDREN IN DANGER

The lives and futures of children and families in Ukraine hang in the balance. We must act quickly, and we must act now if we are going to help prevent a humanitarian catastrophe. Thank you again for your support.”

Morning Drop-Off

- A polite reminder to parents/carers not to use the staff car park to drop students (or pick them up). There's limited room to turn, it adds an extra risk for people on foot, we have had several bumps and scrapes of vehicles this year which are a pain for all concerned (especially if names and details are not left), and we are increasingly seeing cars backing along Station Road to let someone out, which is a risk to student pedestrians, cyclists and others. The best place to drop students is in the coach park. Clearly, we make an exception for students with disabilities or mobility issues.

Bah, Humbug

- I know, it's nearly Easter, but I was disappointed to receive another directive from the Department of Education advising schools against including any April Fool's messages or jokes in communications or on websites. I think they are concerned about the level of misinformation in society, including on very serious world issues, and April Fool jokes risk confusing students and parents even more. At one level, I suppose, an April Fool is a deliberate piece of misinformation, but they are usually on obscure local issues and have humorous intent. Personally, I don't really see the harm; some of Clyst Vale's previous April Fools have even come true – our llama farm story, for example, as I gaze out at the alpaca every lunchtime. Although others, such as car parking meters in the car parks clearly have not. Anyway directive No.14 will be observed. But I am very worried how Primary Schools are going to handle the Santa Misinformation Dilemma should directive 14 be extended.

Rook (or maybe crow) in the Giraffe House

- At some point a large black bird strolled into the Giraffe House through an open door and couldn't get out again (it was probably following a trail of crumbs from one of the students who eat muffins one microscopic fragment at a time). Although it wasn't going to dive down and peck students' heads, it was a H&S risk, so we had to shut off the Giraffe House yesterday and part of today.

Of course, several hundred students all talking at once would have distressed it quite badly. A new bird-watching club became very popular at breaks and lunchtime. After extensive consultations with the RSPB, RSPCA and the Fire Service, eventually one of our intrepid caretakers made a hole in the roof and the bird escaped back into the wild. Needless to say, several places in the Giraffe House were spattered with good luck tokens, and the room was thoroughly cleaned.

There have been some fantastic things going on – Rosslyn Park Sevens, Youth Cultural Champions leading staff training, and of course Legally Blonde. It has been a very tough few weeks, particularly with staff absences, and we have been very close to needing to send a year group home – my colleagues have been magnificent. There are a few staff changes to report. I bet you can't wait until Tuesday !

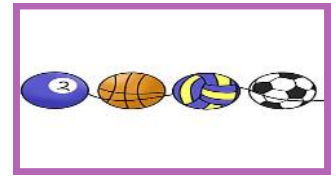

Exam Invigilators

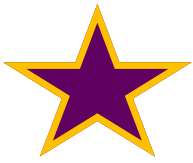

Attendance, Absence and Requests for Absence

Please let the College know of any absence on the first day it occurs.

If the absence continues beyond the first day, please contact the College on each subsequent day of absence, too. To comply with safeguarding obligations, we cannot simply assume a student's sickness absence is ongoing; we need to be certain that the reason for absence is due to continuing illness.

If you do not notify the College, then we will make contact with you to identify the reason for absence. This is important as it helps to reduce unauthorised absences and truancy.

Please note, the College may ask you to provide medical proof if a student is absent from College due to illness.

Medical Appointments

We encourage students to maximise their levels of attendance; research indicates a direct link between attendance and examination performance. The timing of many medical appointments means that often students can attend school first, and return afterwards. By doing so, students minimise missed learning whilst keeping their attendance levels as high as possible. Therefore, we ask that parents/carers send their child into school for morning registration, even when a medical appointment takes place in the middle of the morning. Similarly, appointments scheduled for the afternoon should, where possible, be arranged after Period 4 - during lunchtime. Students are encouraged to return to school after a lunchtime appointment, if they can.

Thank you for your support in helping your child maximise their attendance and learning.

COLLEGE DRESS

Clyst Vale aims to maintain a simple pattern of College dress to promote a clear sense of identity and enable students to come sensibly dressed, at reasonable cost, for a range of learning activities. If a student is improperly dressed, correct uniform will be provided for that day or the student may be sent home to change his/her clothing, at the discretion of the Principal. **If parents are in any doubt about the suitability of an item of uniform they should check with the College before buying it.**

Uniform for all students in Years 7 to 11

- White collared shirt
- School colour tie
- Clyst Vale V-neck jumper with College logo.
- Boys trousers - Banner Slimbridge (Black)/Banner Falmouth (Black).
- Girls trousers - Trutex GTN (2 pocket black)/David Luke DL965 black).
- Skirts - Blue Tartan and knee length
- Trutex Senior stitched down/Taylor Tartan (blue) skirt and may be worn no more than 2" above the knee. Knee length black tailored shorts may be worn.
- Black sturdy shoes or **all black** trainers.
- White socks or black tights with skirts.
- Clyst Vale reversible jacket or other outdoor coat.

- Eyebrow jewellery, facial, tongue, nose and lip studs are not permitted.
- Leather jackets, all denim garments and all hoodies are not permitted.
- Hats should not be worn indoors.
- Outer coats should be predominantly plain in colour and without large logos.
- A plain white t-shirt or vest may be worn under the shirt.
- On health and safety grounds, shoes should be appropriate for a work place. Flipflops, open toes, Uggs, Dr Martens (or equivalent) are not permitted.
- Jewellery may be worn, providing it is not excessive or potentially hazardous. However, it is a legal requirement that all jewellery must be removed before undertaking sporting activities. It is the responsibility of the wearer to do this.

The Principal, in consultation with the Governors of the College, will decide on the suitability of the appearance of a student attending the College - extreme hair styles, of either cut or colour, are not permitted.
