Dear Parents/Carers

Year 10 Mocks

Several parents have contacted us to query apparently low mock exam grades, which are in many cases lower than target or "likely" grade. They should be reassured that their offspring have not suddenly become less clever overnight, or that teachers have suddenly become incompetent. The most important grade comparison to be made is that between the target and the likely grade (in the second column). The mock grade must be viewed with caution as it is likely to be lower than expectations: this is due to a variety of factors including the new style of exams in most subjects, unfamiliarity with this change, grade boundaries being unclear with different information in different subjects, and the perennial issue that *some* students approach mocks (especially in Year 10 when GCSEs seem a lifetime away) with the attitude that they aren't the 'real thing'.

If it helps, we're not alone. A week or so ago the BBC reported a Maths teacher from County Durham, who said: "We still haven't got our head around what the grade boundaries are because no-one [exam boards] will provide us with any. So we're giving them mock exams and then telling them 'we think that your grade might be a four, or might be a five, or it might be a six, or it could be anything because we don't know. Compared to last year, the marks are very, very low. You sit down with the kids and you try to make them feel like actually they're doing well, they're working hard and 'I know that last year you would have got a grade B, you're that kind of student, you would have got a grade B last year. This year I think you're probably going to get a five but I have no clue'." The ghost of Mr Gove's reforms still hovers in the background, and this is the sharp end of it. Under-confident students, frustrated teachers and worried parents. In hindsight, it might have been better if we had not published the mock grades, but kept them for internal purposes only. In the meantime, like schools up and down the country, we will continue to keep abreast of all the latest developments, and do our damnedest to make sure your sons and daughters are prepared as well as possible and not disadvantaged in any way. One positive from all this is that students have now experienced what teachers have been saying about the new GCSEs being more demanding, and many will need to work harder.

Sports Award Evening

This is an annual event, but it never loses its charm or positivity. The best sporting students in Years 9-11 are invited; progress and achievement awards are presented; there are half-colours and full colours for older students; and the top award of "Sports Ambassador of the Year" is presented to a student who has performed very well in their sport, generally a range of sports, but also gives selflessly of their time to help other, coach, and/or officiate. In so doing they demonstrate both enthusiasm and commitment, as well as the character education traits of leadership, teamwork, resilience and preparing to try new challenges (curiosity). This year's winner was Tom Bradner in Year 11, who exemplifies all of the above. The guest of honour was ex-student, now international elite athlete Kelsea Purchall, who gave an excellent and inspiring speech describing how within a couple of years she left Clyst Vale as a rugby player and transformed into a Youth Olympic bronze-medal winning bob-sleigher. It was a really great evening, and my thanks go the PE department for celebrating the achievements and benefits of sport. We do try very hard at CVCC to recognise all types of student, whether they are academic, artistic, dramatic or sporty. Thanks also to the students who turn out for the College teams, as they are great ambassadors for us; and also to parents and carers for the inevitable taxi service which goes with after-school fixtures....

Ten Tors

Still on the general themes of "sport" and "character", next weekend (6-7 May) will see at least sixteen Clyst Vale students take part in the Ten Tors on Dartmoor. Once again, we have been allocated three team slots, 1 x 45 mile and 2 x 35 mile. There are age limits, so we have "borrowed" a couple of ex-students to make up the 45-mile team; however, both 35-mile teams are Clyst Vale through-and-through, and we are aware of at least two more students who are walking with Exeter Scouts. Ten Tors requires a fair amount of training, and a number of colleagues have helped out, especially with training walks. However, I must particularly acknowledge Mr Eales for his overall coordination and leadership, and the incredible voluntary support provided by ex-CVCC parent and ex-Governor Graeme Robb.

Exam Season

The exam season has started, with Art and Photography Final Piece "exams" this week. So far, so good. Next week there are assessments in GCSE Music and Drama, as well as Year 10's externally set exams in Science. A fortnight on Monday, we hold the first formal sit-down-in-the-Hall exams. Therefore, the next couple of weeks are extremely important for students in exam years, as revision is going on in every lesson as well as additional lunchtime sessions and some after school. Most students will cope reasonably well, but if you have any concerns whatsoever please contact the relevant AtHoS (Y10-11) or Mrs Barrington (Post-16).

"Fiddle Toys"

These are the latest craze. Hardly any student needs a fiddle toy; there are exceptions, whereby a student may have a special need for which a fiddle toy is beneficial, but most students do not need them. Further, when a child does genuinely need such a toy, they are not likely to spin around or need buttons pushing. Most (genuine) fiddle toys are calming in texture and design. They are not illegal, and in fact are pretty harmless, but far from preventing distractions and helping students learn, they are actually *causing* distractions as they spin and whizz, and students compare them, and knock them off the desk. Therefore, we are assembling a list of students who, for reasons of genuine need, will benefit from a fiddle toy. Otherwise, they should not be brought to school, and hopefully the craze will pass quickly.

Since last October a group of Year 9, 10 & 12 students have been training hard for this year's Ten Tors Challenge which takes place on Dartmoor on 6th and 7th May 2017. There are just a few days left before departing for Dartmoor and finding out which 35-mile routes the two Year 9 and 10 teams have been allocated and which 45-mile route the Year 12 team has been given. It's the sixth year Clyst Vale has had teams in the Ten Tors event, and we wish all 20 of the students taking part (two are walking with the Exeter Scouts' team) every success on their 35 and 45 mile routes around the hills and tors of Dartmoor. It will be possible to follow their progress around the routes on the Ten Tors website (www.tentors.org.uk/) using our team code which is 1234. 

School Transport

- Clyst Vale supports the (DCC) Devon County Council's "No Pass No Travel Scheme" that operates on transport to and from this College.
- Only students who show a valid travel pass to the driver on every journey will be allowed to travel.
 Students must travel on the vehicle indicated on their pass.
- 3. Please ensure that your child has their travel pass before they leave home every day.
- 4. Please ensure that your child knows what to do in the event they are not allowed to travel or the bus does not arrive (e.g. because of breakdown or traffic conditions or severe weather). College attendance is very important and it is best to be prepared for any of these eventualities.
- 5. DCC will carry out regular pass checks throughout the year.
- 6. Drivers are not allowed to carry passengers who cannot show a valid pass.
- If your child loses their pass during the day they should go to the AtHoS offices to ask for a 10 day temporary pass. Replacement passes cost £5 each and can be ordered online, or by sending a cheque with a replacement form.

COLLEGE DRESS

Clyst Vale aims to maintain a simple pattern of College dress to promote a clear sense of identity and enable students to come sensibly dressed, at reasonable cost, for a range of learning activities. If a student is improperly dressed, correct uniform will be provided for that day or the student may be sent home to change his/her clothing, at the discretion of the Principal.

If parents are in any doubt about the suitability of an item of uniform they should check with the College before buying it.

Uniform for all Students in Years 7 to 11

- White collared shirt.
- · School colour tie.
- Clyst Vale V-neck jumper with School colour logo.
- Trousers should be plain, black, formal and full length. This means no jeans, leggings, chinos or any trousers with rivets or studs. Trousers must be worn on the waist.
- Skirts should be plain black, and may be worn just above the knee. Skirts must be A-line or straight, but not stretchy or "skater" style.
- Knee length black tailored shorts may be worn in the summer.
- Black sturdy shoes or all black trainers.
- Clyst Vale reversible jacket or other outdoor coat.

All uniform can be purchased from Thomas Moore, Exeter. Thomas Moore offers both a personal service in their shop and also the opportunity to order on line at www.thomasmooretoymaster.co.uk.

- Eyebrow jewellery, facial, tongue, nose and lip studs are not permitted.
- Leather jackets, all denim garments and all hoodies are not permitted.
- Hats should not be worn indoors.
- Outer coats should be predominantly plain in colour and without large logos.
- A plain white t-shirt or vest may be worn under the shirt.
- On health and safety grounds, shoes should be appropriate for a work place. Flipflops, open toes, Uggs, Dr Martens (or equivalent) are not permitted.
- Jewellery may be worn, providing it is not excessive or potentially hazardous. However, it is a legal
 requirement that all jewellery must be removed before undertaking sporting activities. It is the
 responsibility of the wearer to do this.

The Principal, in consultation with the Governors of the College, will decide on the suitability of the appearance of a student attending the College – extreme hair styles, of either cut or colour, are not permitted.
