Exam Season

The exam season officially ended yesterday with the final A-level. Earlier in the week Year 9 had exams in the Core subjects, and students were also introduced for the first time to the routines and expectations of the exam rooms; they did very well. My thanks go to my colleagues, especially our excellent exam team, the team of invigilators, students themselves, and to parents for all your support. Although the exams are done, there are one or two GCSE equivalent vocational subjects where there is still an opportunity for students to improve their coursework.

Proms

Almost immediately the exams are over, we hold the Proms! Last night was the Year 11 Prom at Reed Hall, and was a fantastic event. As always, the arrivals were an impressive variety ranging from mobility scooters to a Santa Sleigh, and our students had made a great effort, looking like the fine young adults we have been trying to create over the past five years. The rain just about held off, too. This is the fifth year we have used Reed Hall, and it is an excellent venue, even with the tight turning circle which adds a certain dramatic tension to the evening. A huge number of staff are behind the Prom’s success, but special mention must go to the ATHOSs for all their hard work. The Year 13 event is this evening....

New Intake Days and Parents’ Evening

Almost immediately the Proms are over and we wave goodbye to Years 11 and 13, we wave hello to next year’s Year 7 – this feels something like a metaphor for the pace of education these days! The pupils will visit for three transition days from Wednesday to Friday, following a mixed programme of lessons, pastoral and getting-to-know-the-College activities. Going to big school is a big step (or should be), so we are very keen that our current students are welcoming, treat the pupils with respect, and certainly do not seek to regard them as a novelty. We’re well aware that friendships from Y5/Y6 classes last year will be renewed, but this needs to be positive and supportive.

Deep Learning Day

Yesterday was a particularly good Deep Learning Day. Year 7 really enjoyed their trip to Paignton Zoo to look at habitat, and were superb ambassadors for the College. The Civil War day went especially well this year, with impressive student engagement and suitable horror at some of the operations which were “performed”. Year 9’s Day of Difference is always powerful and emotionally exhausting, but there was an extra-special feel about yesterday’s, which drove home strong messages about how humans should treat one another, but often don’t. Year 10 had a mixed provision; a project called “Five Lives” follows the lives of five young people and the issues facing them with regard to relationships, sex, abuse and drugs; it is a well-regarded and hard-hitting part of the Course 42 provision. Careers have moved on a long way since we prepared students for formal panel interviews and CVs on paper; they are far more likely to attend an “assessment centre” and be observed performing group tasks. This was the other part of the Year 10 day: thinking about skills, and in particular the skills required to perform well in such tasks. We are very grateful to our enterprise partners and others for supporting this session.

Out and About

There have also been some curricular-based visits this week. Year 10 Geographers went to Dawlish on Monday to consider longshore drift and its impact; fortunately the extensive recent beach works to address the very issue of longshore drift was not a hindrance! On Tuesday, Year 12 Biologists were also at Dawlish on fieldwork exploring the coastal environment. Sixteen Year 7 students attended a Space Day at Exeter College with demonstrations, hands-on activities and a planetarium experience. The day was excellent, but the students are doing their own write-ups which will appear on the website next week, so I won’t steal their thunder.

Coach Park Morning Drop-off

We have never had an accident in the coach park (to my memory, at least) during the morning drop-off. This is mostly due to the good sense and reactions of drivers and a credit to road safety teaching in Primary Schools. However, we hope to make things safer with some small adjustments to be completed during the summer holidays. The main change will be to introduce a drop-off lane and point; this is pretty much the same as now, except that we would like parents to drop off by the (currently) disused concrete sign posts so that students cross to the end of the DT block. We will paint a pedestrian crossing at this point, as well as repainting the other lines and boxes. There are also plans to put in a path from the pavement on the sharp corner to this pedestrian crossing so that students do not have to use the vehicle entrance to access the site.

Internet Safety: Snapchat has a new feature

Snapchat has recently developed a ‘Maps’ facility that can be accessed on the main Snapchat screen. It is possible to access a global map that shows your exact location in ‘real-time’. It will also show the location of all friends and people who may have added you, even if you have not added them. This links to another feature called ‘our story’, so if someone takes a Snapchat and sends it to ‘our story’ then it becomes accessible to literally anyone else in the world. If you wish to prevent your information being shared globally, go to “settings” in the top right hand corner of the screen. Access an option called ‘Ghost Mode’, and move the tab to the right so that it goes green (i.e. switched on).

If your child is interested in being part of the next Ski Trip in 2019 they need to collect a letter from Mrs Woolacott or from the folder outside of the PE office.

Pila is an excellent beginner resort with over 70kms of pistes offering high altitude, snowsure skiing for everyone from complete beginners to those who have previously skied. The price will be **£969.00** which includes the following:

- Travel from College to resort and return journey (luxury 49 seater coach fitted with seat belts), plus ferry, together with use of coach whilst in resort
- Ski lessons (morning and afternoon for six days)
- Hire of skis, boots and poles
- Full area lift pass
- Full insurance (including 24 hour Medicare, ski breakage and snow guarantee)
- Full board accommodation, including hot lunch on the slopes
- Après-ski activities, such as ice-skating, tubing, ski test and Presentation Evening
- College ski hooded sweatshirt

Behaviour and achievement points will be taken into consideration prior to students being accepted on this trip.



School Transport

1. Clyst Vale supports the (DCC) Devon County Council's "No Pass No Travel Scheme" that operates on transport to and from this College.
2. Only students who show a valid travel pass to the driver **on every journey** will be allowed to travel. Students must travel on the vehicle indicated on their pass.
3. **Please ensure that your child has their travel pass before they leave home every day.**
4. Please ensure that your child knows what to do in the event they are not allowed to travel or the bus does not arrive (e.g. because of breakdown or traffic conditions or severe weather). College attendance is very important and it is best to be prepared for any of these eventualities.
5. DCC will carry out regular pass checks throughout the year.
6. Drivers are not allowed to carry passengers who cannot show a valid pass.
7. If your child loses their pass during the day they should go to the AtHoS offices to ask for a 10 day temporary pass. Replacement passes cost £5 each and can be ordered online, or by sending a cheque with a replacement form.

Attendance, Absence and Requests for Absence

You need to let the College know of any absence on the first day it occurs. If you do not notify the College, then your Assistant to Head of School (AtHoS) will contact you to identify the reason for absence. This will help to reduce unauthorised absences and truancy.

COLLEGE DRESS

Clyst Vale aims to maintain a simple pattern of College dress to promote a clear sense of identity and enable students to come sensibly dressed, at reasonable cost, for a range of learning activities. If a student is improperly dressed, correct uniform will be provided for that day or the student may be sent home to change his/her clothing, at the discretion of the Principal.

If parents are in any doubt about the suitability of an item of uniform they should check with the College before buying it.

Uniform for all Students in Years 7 to 11

- White collared shirt.
- School colour tie.
- Clyst Vale V-neck jumper with School colour logo.
- Trousers should be plain, black, formal and full length. This means no jeans, leggings, chinos or any trousers with rivets or studs. Trousers must be worn on the waist.
- Skirts should be plain black, and may be worn just above the knee. Skirts must be A-line or straight, but not stretchy or "skater" style.
- Knee length black tailored shorts may be worn in the summer.
- Black sturdy shoes or all black trainers.
- Clyst Vale reversible jacket or other outdoor coat.

All uniform can be purchased from Thomas Moore, Exeter. Thomas Moore offers both a personal service in their shop and also the opportunity to order on line at www.thomasmooretoymaster.co.uk.

- Eyebrow jewellery, facial, tongue, nose and lip studs are not permitted.
- Leather jackets, all denim garments and all hoodies are not permitted.
- Hats should not be worn indoors.
- Outer coats should be predominantly plain in colour and without large logos.
- A plain white t-shirt or vest may be worn under the shirt.
- On health and safety grounds, shoes should be appropriate for a work place. Flipflops, open toes, Uggs, Dr Martens (or equivalent) are not permitted.
- Jewellery may be worn, providing it is not excessive or potentially hazardous. However, it is a legal requirement that all jewellery must be removed before undertaking sporting activities. It is the responsibility of the wearer to do this.

The Principal, in consultation with the Governors of the College, will decide on the suitability of the appearance of a student attending the College – extreme hair styles, of either cut or colour, are not permitted.

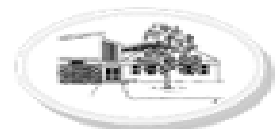
