#### Year 11 Exams

• Year 11 students have been wonderful in their attitude and approach to the exams this week. I cannot praise them highly enough. This is in the context of doing the exams anyway; the possibility of their use if GCSEs are cancelled next summer; the general unsettled atmosphere in society and more anxiety in young people; cold exam rooms (for ventilation) and coats. Students in general have also been highly respectful and quiet during exam times.

#### "Thank You" from St Petrocks

- We received a very nice "thank you" letter with regard to the "Harvest Festival" food and toiletries Year 8 students and others donated. Always happy to promote their work, this includes "The College's kindness will help us make a lasting difference in the lives of local people without a home; we greatly appreciate your continued support in these challenging times. Please pass on our thanks to all those involved in making this donation. St Petrock's has continued to adapt our services in recent months in response to changing need. Our mobile rough sleeper support team are out twice each weekday to engage with people around the city, serving take-away breakfasts & cooked lunches to rough-sleepers en route. Meal provision opens up conversations about individual needs, which are followed up with appointments in St Petrock's centre. In the first 6 months of 2021, there were 2,254 client visits to our centre for more focussed support via appointment, including key-working, basic survival services (clothing; laundry facilities; phone-charging; showers; toiletries; sleeping bags; phone & computer access), housing assessment & referral and a specialist welfare rights service. We have been able to introduce new services to aid clients' recovery from the longer term impacts of the pandemic, including mental health clinics, a women's well-being group ,and are also delighted to have been approved as an official Covid vaccination site."
- I must reiterate the thanks to all involved for the donations, especially Miss Brotherton and the B&V team, and of course students and parents.

#### Covid

- Clyst Vale case rates remain low, but increasing very slightly. There are currently 17 students and two members of staff who are isolating.
- There have been two clarifications since my letter on Tuesday:
  - Sixth formers in schools are expected to be part of mass testing for their school; this doesn't apply to students in FE or Sixth Form Colleges.
  - It may well be that schools could be venues for 12-15 second vaccinations (but vaccinations will be available at vaccination hubs and walk ins).
  - We still await clarification if any variation will be permitted to the big, disruptive, staggered start mass-testing. As the government seem determined that as many people as possible should meet in large groups, I don't hold out much hope.
- Please keep LFT testing twice a week.
- Please keep your children well-supplied with a mask; these are now mandatory on public and school transport.
- We have been asked by the Devon Virgin Care SAIS Team to issue the following letter:

#### Dear Parents/guardians,

#### How to access the first dose of Covid-19 vaccination for 12-15 year olds

We are aware that for several reasons there are some children aged 12 and over who may not have received their first Covid-19 vaccination at school or at a local vaccination centre yet. We want to support as many children and young people and their families who wish to have their vaccination to be able to do so. These vaccines are still available and you can book an appointment through the National booking system <u>https://www.nhs.uk/book-a-coronavirus-vaccination</u> or by calling 119.

There are appointments available for 12-15 year olds and all the centres run sessions for 12-15 year olds outside school hours for your convenience and to allow school attendance to continue uninterrupted.

#### A few key facts to remember when booking your appointment

- If your child has had a positive Covid test they should not receive the Covid-19 vaccination for 12 weeks (this advice changed on 18.11.2021).
- If your child is clinically vulnerable, they should have already been recommended to receive two vaccines with an eight-week gap. This group of children are still recommended to only have a 28-day gap between a positive Covid test and receiving the vaccine.
- If your child has received the first dose, they now will be eligible for a second dose however, it is currently recommended that there is a minimum of 12 weeks after the first dose and you will be unable to book this until this time.

#### **Student Absence**

- In normal times, we all know there is a strong correlation between good/bad attendance and good/ bad exam results. We know that our attendance target is 95%, in line with national averages. We also know that persistent absence can lead to enforcement actions including letters, fines and in extreme cases prosecution. I don't think we are in normal times, but once again I find myself at odds with the Department for Education who seem determined that we are. The government is worried about attendance levels (I agree with this), and in a recent letter school leaders have been told to "make full use of enforcement actions" (I don't agree with this as a black and white blanket solution). We should have been doing this from September, but remember that we had over 200 students isolating with covid and it seemed completely wrong to issue warning letters to their parents. Since half-term we have been issuing the first warning letters to parents of students who have poor attendance but who have not had covid. In other words, I believe strongly that students should be in College for their educational and social development, and if there is no good reason for a high level of absence, we will use enforcement measures.
- Our overall attendance rates since September have broadly been in line with national (around 90% currently), although they did take a hammering in late September-early October when covid rates were very high. This headline figure is quite reassuring and positive, but it does mask one or two groups of students (such as pupil premium and some SEND) where attendance is lower, and we will work with those families as sensitively as possible.

#### **Carol Service**

• The media is awash with conflicting stories about school nativities being cancelled, going ahead, or being live-streamed to parents shivering in the car park; I really do not envy my Primary colleagues who have to make the decision. We're fully intending to go ahead with the Carol Service on Wednesday 15th December at St Mary's Church, Whimple, clearly with covid precautions in place. I suppose there is a chance of a big outbreak at College or locally, and we will respect the regulations of the Church, but we are looking forward to seeing this back on the calendar.

#### Platinum Jubilee Additional Day's Holiday

• In June 2022, the Queen will celebrate 70 years as monarch. You'll be aware that there is an extra Bank Holiday on Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> June. Schools are on holiday that day anyway, so the government has decided we can have an extra day off, to make the school year 189 days. The Governors in consultation with staff have decided on Wednesday, 20<sup>th</sup> April 2022, which means that there is a full two weeks' holiday. Students will return to writing, Drama lessons and Romeo & Juliet revision on Thursday 21<sup>st</sup> April, Shakespeare's birthday. From a parent/carer point of view it is probably a bit more convenient to extend the Easter holiday by a day (May half-term would have been ideal, but of course there will be exams which won't run themselves). We could have tagged it on to February half-term, but of course the weather is so much better at Easter and we should reduce the temptation of spending all day cooped up on their x-boxes.....

#### Term Dates 2022-23

- I apologise that these are a bit late this year. I have attached "the grid" to add to your weekend puzzle page, and the dates are also on the College website, link as follows http://www.clystvale.org/wp-content/uploads/2021/12/CVCC-Term-Dates-2022-23.pdf
- There are no adjustments or anything controversial, and the dates are very close to the Devon pattern. Where there is a training day or an occasional day, students are not expected in College (on the two occasional days, neither are most colleagues).

#### Staff absence

Although absence through covid has not been too high, the attritional nature of the past term plus more unpleasant colds, respiratory infections and other illnesses has caused pressure on staffing. We are nowhere near anything drastic like closure or part-closure, but daily staff absence has been running around 10% for over three weeks. Many organisations are reporting the same, and if you work in an organisation with continuing staff shortages, you will know the difficulties. Certain teams or departments have been hit harder than others. But overall, and I hope your children echo this, most lessons are unaffected, and most activities and opportunities are continuing. My colleagues are working incredibly hard, but it does take its toll.

#### A Plea from Reception and AtHoS

It's possibly tiredness all round, but there has been a sharp increase in students forgetting not only their masks, but their PE kit, food ingredients, and also not having any money on their cashless food account. It's one of those things whereby one forgotten PE kit isn't that much of a problem (the student receptionist takes it and interrupts a lesson briefly if breaktime is not an option), but we had five before break today. The lack of food money is a difficulty, as students have usually handled the food before they realise, so that food can't be re-sold and is disposed of. Of course, the huge majority of parents still fulfil their responsibility of checking timetables, ask about inter-tutor sport on a Friday, and head off these little issues before they start. [When my three were at school we had a copy of their timetables on the fridge door. When they had a bad timetable day coming up, this put into perspective the tragic absence of chocolate milk in the fridge (even though they had drunk it all the night before)]

#### **Traffic Report**

- Station Road Closure, Weds 15<sup>th</sup> 24<sup>th</sup> December. South West Water have notified us of a 9 day road closure at the London Road end of Station Road from "Station Road to Coachfield House", outside 'Southview'. Local residents will also have been notified, but if you live further afield, and use that end of Station Road, you might not be aware.
- Too many parents are still parking in Tower View. The residents, rightly, are brassed off when cars are parked across their driveways and even across the entrance to the road. Please arrive a bit later, or pick up elsewhere.

When dropping off in the morning, please pull down the coach park as far as possible.

#### Site Works Update

• The roofing work is complete, and the much-delayed window work continues to be delayed and will run into the Spring Term. At this rate the scaffolding will still be up at Easter. And the window work will mean some re-rooming of classes. I'm not a great fan of scaffolding when school is in session, but it's a necessary evil. And while scaffolding creates single-file pinch-points, especially outside SC6-PA1-Giraffe House entrance, I have been hugely impressed and pleased by the consideration and good sense of our students.

This is rather an information-rich Newsletter. It doesn't do justice to the atmosphere, relationships, chat, noise, smiles, trials and tribulations of that fascinating creature, the secondary school student. Plus, Christmas decorations are appearing, and suddenly there's only two haribo-filled weeks left of the term....

#### Attendance, Absence and Requests for Absence

Please let the College know of any absence on the first day it occurs. If the absence continues beyond the first day, please contact the College on each subsequent day of absence, too. To comply with safeguarding obligations, we cannot simply assume a student's sickness absence is ongoing; we need to be certain that the reason for absence is due to continuing illness.

If you do not notify the College, then we will make contact with you to identify the reason for absence. This is important as it helps to reduce unauthorised absences and truancy.

Please note, the College may ask you to provide medical proof if a student is absent from College due to illness.

#### **Medical Appointments**

We encourage students to maximise their levels of attendance; research indicates a direct link between attendance and examination performance. The timing of many medical appointments means that often students can attend school first, and return afterwards. By doing so, students minimise missed learning whilst keeping their attendance levels as high as possible. Therefore, we ask that parents/carers send their child into school for morning registration, even when a medical appointment takes place in the middle of the morning. Similarly, appointments scheduled for the afternoon should, where possible, be arranged after Period 4 - during lunchtime. Students are encouraged to return to school after a lunchtime appointment, if they can.

Thank you for your support in helping your child maximise their attendance and learning.

#### COLLEGE DRESS

Clyst Vale aims to maintain a simple pattern of College dress to promote a clear sense of identity and enable students to come sensibly dressed, at reasonable cost, for a range of learning activities. If a student is improperly dressed, correct uniform will be provided for that day or the student may be sent home to change his/her clothing, at the discretion of the Principal. If parents are in any doubt about the suitability of an item of uniform they should check with the College before buying it.

#### Uniform for all students in Years 7 to 11

- White collared shirt
- School colour tie
- Clyst Vale V-neck jumper with College logo.
- Boys trousers Banner Slimbridge (Black)/Banner Falmouth (Black).
- Girls trousers Trutex GTN (2 pocket black)/David Luke DL965 black).
- Skirts Blue Tartan and knee length
- Trutex Senior stitched down/Taylor Tartan (blue) skirt and may be worn no more than 2" above the knee. Knee length black tailored shorts may be worn.
- Black sturdy shoes or **all black** trainers.
- White socks or black tights with skirts.
- Clyst Vale reversible jacket or other outdoor coat.

## All uniform and PE Kit can be purchased from Thomas Moore, Exeter. Thomas Moore offers both a personal service in their shop and also the opportunity to order on line at www.thomasmooretoymaster.co.uk

- Eyebrow jewellery, facial, tongue, nose and lip studs are not permitted.
- Leather jackets, all denim garments and all hoodies are not permitted.
- Hats should not be worn indoors.
- Outer coats should be predominantly plain in colour and without large logos.
- A plain white t-shirt or vest may be worn under the shirt.
- On health and safety grounds, shoes should be appropriate for a work place. Flipflops, open toes, Uggs, Dr Martens (or equivalent) are not permitted.
- Jewellery may be worn, providing it is not excessive or potentially hazardous. However, it is a legal requirement that all jewellery must be removed before undertaking sporting activities. It is the responsibility of the wearer to do this.

The Principal, in consultation with the Governors of the College, will decide on the suitability of the appearance of a student attending the College - extreme hair styles, of either cut or colour, are not permitted.
