Dear Parents/Carers,

Year 12 Parents' Evening

Last night was generally very positive, and a big thank you to parents for your attendance. There was a good atmosphere, and teachers reported that it was a valuable evening. Year 12 as a cohort settled well into A-level, and continue to display a positive attitude. A-levels are challenging, though, and there is plenty of work ahead. Their end of year exams will be at the end of June.

Year 7 Parents' Evening

The questionnaire results from the parents evening are presented here, and are very heartening, with all indicators over 90% positive. 93 questionnaires were completed, which is a very good return, so many thanks for doing this! One interesting analysis is across time. For example, dealing with bullying is regarded below as positive, as it has been at other parents' evenings this year, and this has improved overall over the last three years. On the other hand, homework consistently bumps around in the low 90s, and remains a clear focus for us.

Exams

It's the time of year where it is almost impossible to make blanket comments. Some students have already completed elements of their GCSEs and A-levels; this week there were French orals, Drama presentations and PE practicals, next week is the calm before the storm of the official exam season, with just GCSE Spanish and A-level French orals. For our most highly-motivated, conscientious and worried students, the long weekend should be used for some sleep and downtime; however, for students who haven't really started revising the weekend is a great opportunity to make up lost time. There has been a huge amount of input and advice from teachers and tutors, and the only thing I can usefully add is that if they haven't already done so, students should be planning out on a daily planner when their exams are, so that they can see which subjects to focus on first and identify pressure points. Planning is not revision in itself, but it is well known to help prioritisation, spread out the pressures a little, and help reduce stress. Internet Safety

This morning, Gary Gates gave two assemblies to Year 7 and Year 9 respectively about internet safety. There is absolutely no doubt that young people are very knowledgeable and skilful users of websites, apps and social media, but (like a lot of adults as well) never read the terms and conditions. This alone puts them at risk of losing personal data and rights over images. All of Gary's examples and illustrations come from his experience in the Police and subsequent restorative work with schools. Sadly, just as young people have become ever more skilful, so have the hackers and groomers. If you are a parent of a Year 7 or 9 student, ask them what they learned today.

Parents' Interest Group

Gary Gates will be talking to parents about internet safety at the next meeting on Wednesday 16th May, 6.30 pm, in Post-16. This will be an updated version of his presentation last year, reflecting new apps and games, and the relative rise and fall of social media platforms used by young people.

Following two singing workshops earlier this year, twenty Clyst Vale students performed with the Sound of Sirens at a packed Phoenix Theatre last Friday evening. The students joined in with the number "Voices". One of the Sirens is former student Abbe Martin, to whom we are very grateful for providing this great opportunity for our students.

Attenborough's Army

I was privileged to be at the launch meeting of Attenborough's Army (or AA, not to be confused with drinking or driving). Over twenty students attended, and some others had clashes so couldn't be there. The group will be looking for some "quick wins" in site improvement, with the overall challenge being to embed a more environmental awareness throughout the College and, in parallel, engender more pride in Clyst Vale.

Jeans

Jeans are not College uniform, and never have been. There are too many students in Year 11 wearing jeans, and we could really do with more parental support on this matter. It is sometimes difficult to persuade young people to follow the College rules regarding uniform, but it does help us to maintain our high expectations and standards if students comply with the simple uniform rules. Some students claim that their parents won't buy new uniform now because it's close to the end of the year and/or they're leaving; however, a pair of black trousers (not jeans) is a generally useful wardrobe item. For students in Years 7 to 10, please do not think that because other students are wearing jeans that this is acceptable.

Mentioning Year 11, it is expected that students will wear correct uniform to their exams. If they don't, they may be asked to change into something that we provide, or possibly to sit their exam elsewhere in the College.

School Transport

- 1. Clyst Vale supports the (DCC) Devon County Council's "No Pass No Travel Scheme" that operates on transport to and from this College.
- 2. Only students who show a valid travel pass to the driver **on every journey** will be allowed to travel. Students must travel on the vehicle indicated on their pass.
- 3. Please ensure that your child has their travel pass before they leave home every day.
- 4. Please ensure that your child knows what to do in the event they are not allowed to travel or the bus does not arrive (e.g. because of breakdown or traffic conditions or severe weather). College attendance is very important and it is best to be prepared for any of these eventualities.
- 5. DCC will carry out regular pass checks throughout the year.
- 6. Drivers are not allowed to carry passengers who cannot show a valid pass.
- 7. If your child loses their pass during the day they should go to the AtHoS offices to ask for a 10 day temporary pass. Replacement passes cost £5 each and can be ordered online, or by sending a cheque with a replacement form.

COLLEGE DRESS

Clyst Vale aims to maintain a simple pattern of College dress to promote a clear sense of identity and enable students to come sensibly dressed, at reasonable cost, for a range of learning activities. If a student is improperly dressed, correct uniform will be provided for that day or the student may be sent home to change his/her clothing, at the discretion of the Principal.

If parents are in any doubt about the suitability of an item of uniform they should check with the College before buying it.

Uniform for all Students in Years 7 to 11

- · White collared shirt.
- · School colour tie.
- Clyst Vale V-neck jumper with School colour logo.
- Trousers should be plain, black, formal and full length. This means no jeans, leggings, chinos or any trousers with rivets or studs. Trousers must be worn on the waist.
- Skirts should be plain black, and may be worn just above the knee. Skirts must be A-line or straight, but not stretchy or "skater" style.
- Knee length black tailored shorts may be worn in the summer.
- Black sturdy shoes or all black trainers.
- Clyst Vale reversible jacket or other outdoor coat.

Main uniform, PE kit and reversible jacket can be purchased from Thomas Moore.

- Eyebrow jewellery, facial, tongue, nose and lip studs are not permitted.
- Leather jackets, all denim garments and all hoodies are not permitted.
- · Hats should not be worn indoors.
- Outer coats should be predominantly plain in colour and without large logos.
- A plain white t-shirt or vest may be worn under the shirt.
- On health and safety grounds, shoes should be appropriate for a work place. Flipflops, open toes, Uggs, Dr Martens (or equivalent) are not permitted.
- Jewellery may be worn, providing it is not excessive or potentially hazardous. However, it is a legal requirement that all jewellery must be removed before undertaking sporting activities. It is the responsibility of the wearer to do this.

The Principal, in consultation with the Governors of the College, will decide on the suitability of the appearance of a student attending the College – extreme hair styles, of either cut or colour, are not permitted.
