Dear Parents/Carers,

The Spring Break

Well, we've made it to the end of the Spring Term. Many thanks to parents and carers for your continuing support as we strive to help all students to reach their potential, and to develop as responsible citizens! I mentioned last week the importance to students in exam years of using the next couple of weeks wisely. It's not long to exams, so revision done now will build up, be retained, and help reduce anxiety. I spoke to Year 11 students this morning about planning out their time carefully, and I am aware that other teachers have done the same, especially Mrs Oldfield's targeted revision sessions. It's a matter of balance: students need sleep (this is more important than is often realised), hobbies, variety and friends, but these need scaling down and revision needs scaling up. This is a generalised statement, of course: some students are well on top of things with an appropriate balance, while others need complete reprioritisation! Hard work brings rewards.

Sports Award Evening

This was a great way to end the term, and many thanks to the PE department for their organisation. Guest of honour was international rugby referee Luke Pearce (who has a famous brother), who spoke strongly about his passion for sport, about pursuing your goals and putting up with the boring bits without complaining, and that hard work and dedication brings rewards (please see above). It was, as always, a really positive evening. The value of the evening is that it captures the impact and value of all the sport spread out over lessons, lunch times and after school, practices and fixtures, from September to July. It does celebrate achievement: our invincible Y11 basketballers, our equally invincible badminton players, the undefeated u-14 (Y9) rounders team, Ben Parsons and Joe Blackburn in the Exeter Chiefs Academy squad, and individuals like Sam Mills and Rachel Brown who are competing at national events. It also celebrates the students who are keen, reliable, supportive, and give of their best even if the result is going the wrong way. It also celebrates the purer sporting values of putting the team before yourself, of being gracious in victory and defeat, and showing humility. Each year an award is given to a Young Ambassador, who is talented at their sport, but who also does much more than this in supporting others and promoting sport in general. As Mr Pearce commented, there are so many things in going away and staying away which potentially can be difficult, but the superb attitude of the students made it easy. Behaviour and achievement points will be taken into consideration prior to students being accepted on this trip.








Attendance, Absence and Requests for Absence





School Transport

- 1. Clyst Vale supports the (DCC) Devon County Council's "No Pass No Travel Scheme" that operates on transport to and from this College.
- 2. Only students who show a valid travel pass to the driver **on every journey** will be allowed to travel. Students must travel on the vehicle indicated on their pass.
- 3. Please ensure that your child has their travel pass before they leave home every day.
- 4. Please ensure that your child knows what to do in the event they are not allowed to travel or the bus does not arrive (e.g. because of breakdown or traffic conditions or severe weather). College attendance is very important and it is best to be prepared for any of these eventualities.
- 5. DCC will carry out regular pass checks throughout the year.
- 6. Drivers are not allowed to carry passengers who cannot show a valid pass.
- 7. If your child loses their pass during the day they should go to the AtHoS offices to ask for a 10 day temporary pass. Replacement passes cost £5 each and can be ordered online, or by sending a cheque with a replacement form.

COLLEGE DRESS

Clyst Vale aims to maintain a simple pattern of College dress to promote a clear sense of identity and enable students to come sensibly dressed, at reasonable cost, for a range of learning activities. If a student is improperly dressed, correct uniform will be provided for that day or the student may be sent home to change his/her clothing, at the discretion of the Principal. If parents are in any doubt about the suitability of an item of uniform they should check with the College before buying it.

Uniform for all students in Years 7 to 11

- White collared shirt
- School colour tie
- Clyst Vale V-neck jumper with College logo.
- Boys trousers Banner Slimbridge (Black)/Banner Falmouth (Black).
- Girls trousers Trutex GTN (2 pocket black)/David Luke DL965 black).
- All trousers must have Clyst Vale logo rivet on waistband.
- Skirts Blue Tartan.
- Trutex Senior stitched down/Taylor Tartan (blue) skirt and may be worn no more than 2" above the knee. Knee length black tailored shorts may be worn in the summer.
- Black sturdy shoes or all black trainers.
- White socks or black tights with skirts.
- Clyst Vale reversible jacket or other outdoor coat.

All uniform and PE Kit can be purchased from Thomas Moore, Exeter. Thomas Moore offers both a personal service in their shop and also the opportunity to order on line at www.thomasmooretoymaster.co.uk.

- Eyebrow jewellery, facial, tongue, nose and lip studs are not permitted.
- Leather jackets, all denim garments and all hoodies are not permitted.
- Hats should not be worn indoors.
- Outer coats should be predominantly plain in colour and without large logos.
- A plain white t-shirt or vest may be worn under the shirt.
- On health and safety grounds, shoes should be appropriate for a work place. Flipflops, open toes, Uggs, Dr Martens (or equivalent) are not permitted.
- Jewellery may be worn, providing it is not excessive or potentially hazardous. However, it is a legal requirement that all jewellery must be removed before undertaking sporting activities. It is the responsibility of the wearer to do this.

The Principal, in consultation with the Governors of the College, will decide on the suitability of the appearance of a student attending the College - extreme hair styles, of either cut or colour, are not permitted.
