#### Parents' Events Next Week

I am sure you haven't, but please don't forget the Year 10 Parents Information Evening on Tuesday at 6.00 p.m., nor the Year 7 "Meet the Tutor" Evening on Thursday from 4.30 pm. Regarding the Year 10 Evening, we learned a great deal from the first year of (almost all) new syllabi and the 9-1 grading, which we would be delighted to share: there are quite significant differences with GCSEs of just three years ago. The Year 7 Evening is also important, albeit in a different way: transition to secondary school is a big deal for students and parents, and while most make that step with little difficulty, others find it harder. So, this particular evening is to air these concerns and ask any questions before they become big issues, as well as cementing relationships with the tutor. Both events will be in the Post-16 block, and we look forward to seeing you.

#### "Year 6 Tours"

We were very busy with the tours for Year 6 (and 5) pupils and parents this week, which is most encouraging after last week's heaving Open Evening. The feedback was very positive, and once again there was high praise for our student guides from Years 10 and 11, who are incredibly loyal and knowledgeable about the College. As ever, my colleagues were happy to welcome the tours into lessons, and in between pupils and parents could experience the calm and purposeful atmosphere during lesson time.

#### Parents' Information Group (formerly PTFA) A.G.M

Thank you to those parents who attended Wednesday's AGM. After several years of loyal service to the PTFA and College, Jenny Sanders is stepping down as Chair and Anita Hill as Treasurer. Jenny will continue in a support role to new chair Mandy Coslett. The discussion at the AGM seemed to be pointing the group even further away from fund-raising and committees, and more towards being an information group or eventually a Parents' forum. In the meantime, a good-looking programme of evening presentations was agreed, including mental health, Course 42, social media and more. There will be a fuller write up in next week's Newsletter.

#### **Rights Respecting School**

At the AGM, Mrs Battishill gave a really good presentation on Rights Respecting Schools and the progress made in the first five weeks. As she outlined, we've made a great start, but it IS the start of a long journey. It's not just another initiative, nor just an award, but a framework which in time will improve almost all aspects of Clyst Vale. We are concentrating on four key areas: well-being, participation, relationships and self-esteem; clearly, if students are secure in all areas their confidence grows, and with it their learning and achievement. You should have noticed already a number of changes: students will be reporting that tutorial time is more structured than previously; there is a greater volume and variety of praise; "thought of the fortnight" ties into RRS values and is higher profile; there have been several big events including assemblies, the world's biggest lesson and the Youth Parliament vote (below). Rome wasn't built in a day, though, and there is more to do about a College charter, student voice structures, promotion and linking to the UNCRC, more embedding within the curriculum.

#### **Youth Parliament Vote**

There is a national Youth Parliament, which is the only body other than MPs allowed to use the House of Commons for debate. This year, the Youth Parliament encouraged wider democracy by sending out a list of topics and issues for young people nationally to vote on for debate. Yesterday, Clyst Vale students did just that. There was an 87.7% turn-out, with 25% of votes going to the topic of mental health, and 11% to "period poverty" (whereby the price of sanitary protection means that girls from disadvantaged backgrounds are regularly missing school).

#### **Education Funding**

As you'll know, I attended the Headteachers' March in London last week, and a very strange event it was, a genuinely polite protest. In the end, 2000 Heads went, although I believe I was the only one from Devon! It's now established beyond doubt that schools have suffered an 8% cut in finances since 2010; and it now appears that the figure the DfE has been using to claim the highest spending ever on schools may include university and private education fees (paid by parents). I fully intend to keep supporting the WorthLess? campaign; we will do our utmost to maintain our levels of provision and support, but I am really concerned that the current and future generation of children could miss out, and I mean across all schools not just Clyst Vale.

#### Apprenticeship day- 31st January




# October Marketing BULLETIN



#### **School Transport**

- 1. Clyst Vale supports the (DCC) Devon County Council's "No Pass No Travel Scheme" that operates on transport to and from this College.
- 2. Only students who show a valid travel pass to the driver **on every journey** will be allowed to travel. Students must travel on the vehicle indicated on their pass.
- 3. Please ensure that your child has their travel pass before they leave home every day.
- 4. Please ensure that your child knows what to do in the event they are not allowed to travel or the bus does not arrive (e.g. because of breakdown or traffic conditions or severe weather). College attendance is very important and it is best to be prepared for any of these eventualities.
- 5. DCC will carry out regular pass checks throughout the year.
- 6. Drivers are not allowed to carry passengers who cannot show a valid pass.
- 7. If your child loses their pass during the day they should go to the AtHoS offices to ask for a 10 day temporary pass. Replacement passes cost £5 each and can be ordered online, or by sending a cheque with a replacement form.

#### **COLLEGE DRESS FROM SEPTEMBER 2018**

Clyst Vale aims to maintain a simple pattern of College dress to promote a clear sense of identity and enable students to come sensibly dressed, at reasonable cost, for a range of learning activities. If a student is improperly dressed, correct uniform will be provided for that day or the student may be sent home to change his/her clothing, at the discretion of the Principal. If parents are in any doubt about the suitability of an item of uniform they should check with the College before buying it.

#### Uniform for all students in Years 7 to 11

- White collared shirt
- School colour tie
- Clyst Vale V-neck jumper with College logo.
- Boys trousers Banner Slimbridge (Black)/Banner Falmouth (Black).
- Girls trousers Trutex GTN (2 pocket black)/David Luke DL965 black).
- All trousers must have Clyst Vale logo rivet on waistband.
- Skirts Blue Tartan.
- Trutex Senior stitched down/Taylor Tartan (blue) skirt and may be worn no more than 2" above the knee. Knee length black tailored shorts may be worn in the summer.
- Black sturdy shoes or all black trainers.
- White socks or black tights with skirts.
- Clyst Vale reversible jacket or other outdoor coat.

All uniform and PE Kit can be purchased from Thomas Moore, Exeter. Thomas Moore offers both a personal service in their shop and also the opportunity to order on line at www.thomasmooretoymaster.co.uk.

- Eyebrow jewellery, facial, tongue, nose and lip studs are not permitted.
- Leather jackets, all denim garments and all hoodies are not permitted.
- Hats should not be worn indoors.
- Outer coats should be predominantly plain in colour and without large logos.
- A plain white t-shirt or vest may be worn under the shirt.
- On health and safety grounds, shoes should be appropriate for a work place. Flipflops, open toes, Uggs, Dr Martens (or equivalent) are not permitted.
- Jewellery may be worn, providing it is not excessive or potentially hazardous. However, it is a legal requirement that all jewellery must be removed before undertaking sporting activities. It is the responsibility of the wearer to do this.

The Principal, in consultation with the Governors of the College, will decide on the suitability of the appearance of a student attending the College - extreme hair styles, of either cut or colour, are not permitted.
