### **Financial situation**

The week's big news was in my letter to parents and a slightly alarmist article on the "This is Exeter" website. It is true that we will need to make some staffing reductions for September; as student numbers have fluctuated over the years we have increased and decreased staff numbers accordingly; the difference this time is that the numbers are a bit bigger, and we have the media spotlight glare on us: plenty of other schools are in exactly the same position. Invoking the redundancy process is by definition the start of a procedure which unfolds over four months; it does not mean that compulsory redundancies are inevitable; but, which adds to the alarmist tone, it is simply far too early to say. In any case, I don't intend to give a running commentary in the press without informing parents first.

The general rule of thumb in public service organisations is that the maximum staffing cost should be no more than 80% of income; some experts put it at 75% or 78%. With the drop in income (from government reforms and a drop in Sixth Form numbers which affects funding a year behind), if we did not make some reductions we would be well over 80% in September, in other words overstaffed. Therefore, despite the impression created of swingeing cuts, we are actually realigning staffing to a manageable level against national benchmarks. Compared to the last year or two, when we were able to run uneconomic group sizes and some non-essential provision, it will inevitably feel tighter next year. The real story to my mind is how a good school like Clyst Vale, with a healthy carry forward of £250,000 in August 2016, can be so sharply affected by government policies and one change in fortune; we would have managed one or the other without attention, but not both. It is no comfort that accountants Bishop Fleming are reported in the Express & Echo, ironically, as claiming that 7/10 academies are unable to balance their books because of funding pressures.

More importantly, what is the impact likely to be on Clyst Vale's students? It's easier to start with what will remain as now: the curriculum offer in terms of subjects will not change, Year 9 option choices will not change, but it will no longer be possible to run small, uneconomic groups at GCSE. This applies to A-level too, although we are strongly committed to maintaining the Sixth Form at Clyst Vale. There will probably be trimming in several areas of staffing rather than losing a whole section; and Governors are committed in principle to protecting what goes on in the classroom as the first priority. Some group sizes will increase. Subject-specialist teachers will continue to teach GCSE and A-level. We will need to eke out the life of resources and equipment. There is no reason to think that outcomes will suffer; my colleagues are resourceful, committed professionals who will do their utmost for your sons and daughters.

There were two confusing statements which I would like to address directly. One relates to pupil numbers. For demographic reasons, numbers have reduced from their heights of ten years ago, and for demographic reasons are starting to pick up again. That said, there have been no year groups below 150 students, except for the one year when the opening of Cranbrook Education Campus affected us (and that year group has recovered to 145). The only issue with student numbers, which is significant, is that Sixth Form numbers dropped for this September. The second statement is that "staff morale is atrocious". Clearly, the morale of the "source close to the school" is low, but most parents will realise that standards remain high, there is the full range of activities going on, and most

teachers were positive at the Year 11 Parents' Evening and will be on Tuesday's Options Evening. It is tough in education at the moment, and this includes Clyst Vale, but this was an overstatement.

Over the years, Clyst Vale parents have shown great loyalty and support; just as importantly, characteristics include not over-reacting, checking facts, possessing a sense of perspective, and not believing everything in the papers! I would be glad of those qualities at the moment. Yes, we have to make some staffing reductions to bring us into balance; we will seek to avoid compulsory redundancies; we will (it ought to go without saying) seek to minimise the effects on students, as they are our first priority.

### **Making the Parents' Voice Heard**

This is very much a new squad, with only one or two students who have been involved before; it is also a very young team, especially compared to their rivals, a number of whom were Sixth Formers. Therefore, they have done brilliantly, and we are massively proud of them. So, congratulations to Charlie Blackburn, Ed Gold, Elijah Holding, Ellie Harris, Joe Hartley, Maddie Knight and Sam Roberts; and to Mr Hewlett and Dr Turl. All this has been accomplished in students' and staff's own time, which says much about their commitment and passion for engineering; the learning for students is phenomenal, too – this is so much more than driving a remote-controlled car.

### **Year 9 Options**

The Options booklets have gone out, and there will be a range of activities either side of half-term to help Year 9 students find out about courses and make their decisions. We look forward to seeing students and parents at next Tuesday's Options Evening, which is traditionally one of our best-attended and best-appreciated evenings of the year.

### **Apprenticeship Day 1st Feb**

A very useful addition to our Careers Education programme was Wednesday's Apprenticeship Day. Apprenticeships are being heavily promoted and supported at national level, with a target of 3 million places; therefore, this is a genuine opportunity and a further choice for young people to consider (and not just young people: there are a few Level 7 apprenticeships, equivalent to Masters' level study). A representative from the National Apprenticeship Service came down from London for the day, and presented an excellent overview to Year 10 students. Her day also included focused presentations with a more individualised approach for Year 11 and 12 students who had been identified as pursuing the apprenticeship route.

### **Police Takeover Day**

Continuing the Careers Education theme, our regional police force has organised a 'Devon & Cornwall Police and Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner Takeover Day' which is taking place today (3<sup>rd</sup> Feb). Young people from all Devon were invited to apply directly and I am delighted that Clyst Vale will be well represented, with six students being selected: Olivia Hellier, Jack Renfree, Millie-Jo Elliott, Lauren Elliot, Charlie Roberts and Ellen Blackler. Clearly, they have done well to be selected, and it is an excellent opportunity for them.

### **Kirkland Rowell Survey**

Another big thank you to parents who have returned the parental survey. We have had 242 handed in, which is the highest for years and probably a record! They have now been sent off for analysis, which generally takes a month or so.

### **School Transport**

- 1. Clyst Vale supports the (DCC) Devon County Council's "No Pass No Travel Scheme" that operates on transport to and from this College.
- 2. Only students who show a valid travel pass to the driver **on every journey** will be allowed to travel. Students must travel on the vehicle indicated on their pass.
- 3. Please ensure that your child has their travel pass before they leave home every day.
- 4. Please ensure that your child knows what to do in the event they are not allowed to travel or the bus does not arrive (e.g. because of breakdown or traffic conditions or severe weather). College attendance is very important and it is best to be prepared for any of these eventualities.
- 5. DCC will carry out regular pass checks throughout the year.
- 6. Drivers are not allowed to carry passengers who cannot show a valid pass.
- 7. If your child loses their pass during the day they should go to the AtHoS offices to ask for a 10 day temporary pass. Replacement passes cost £5 each and can be ordered online, or by sending a cheque with a replacement form.

### **COLLEGE DRESS**

Clyst Vale aims to maintain a simple pattern of College dress to promote a clear sense of identity and enable students to come sensibly dressed, at reasonable cost, for a range of learning activities. If a student is improperly dressed, correct uniform will be provided for that day or the student may be sent home to change his/her clothing, at the discretion of the Principal.

If parents are in any doubt about the suitability of an item of uniform they should check with the College before buying it.

### Uniform for all Students in Years 7 to 11

- White collared shirt.
- · School colour tie.
- Clyst Vale V-neck jumper with School colour logo.
- Trousers should be plain, black, formal and full length. This means no jeans, leggings, chinos or any trousers with rivets or studs. Trousers must be worn on the waist.
- Skirts should be plain black, and may be worn just above the knee. Skirts must be A-line or straight, but not stretchy or "skater" style.
- Knee length black tailored shorts may be worn in the summer.
- Black sturdy shoes or all black trainers.
- Clyst Vale reversible jacket or other outdoor coat.

**All uniform can be purchased from Thomas Moore, Exeter.** Thomas Moore offers both a personal service in their shop and also the opportunity to order on line at <a href="https://www.thomasmooretoymaster.co.uk">www.thomasmooretoymaster.co.uk</a>.

- Eyebrow jewellery, facial, tongue, nose and lip studs are not permitted.
- Leather jackets, all denim garments and all hoodies are not permitted.
- Hats should not be worn indoors.
- Outer coats should be predominantly plain in colour and without large logos.
- A plain white t-shirt or vest may be worn under the shirt.
- On health and safety grounds, shoes should be appropriate for a work place. Flipflops, open toes, Uggs, Dr Martens (or equivalent) are not permitted.
- Jewellery may be worn, providing it is not excessive or potentially hazardous. However, it is a legal requirement that all jewellery must be removed before undertaking sporting activities. It is the responsibility of the wearer to do this.

The Principal, in consultation with the Governors of the College, will decide on the suitability of the appearance of a student attending the College – extreme hair styles, of either cut or colour, are not permitted.
