Dear Parents/Carers,

Happy New (School) Year!

Welcome back to the new year, and a special welcome to parents of students who have joined Clyst Vale this week. You join us at a good time – there is a real sense of purpose and optimism around the College: we celebrated Oxford university success in the summer, all Year 13 students who applied got in to university, and there were many success stories at GCSE. Two year groups are full, including Year 7, and numbers are on the increase; we had a huge boost by achieving the Rights Respecting Silver Award in July; you will have also received information about an improved and simplified behaviour policy; and (below) we have been joined by a healthy number of new colleagues bringing fresh ideas. There are even three improved toilets in the Giraffe House area! There is more information about the exam results, and the students who have done exceptionally well, on the “rolling news” section on the front page of the website.

We will receive an Ofsted visit at some stage this year. To a large extent, this makes no difference to our priorities: we will continue striving to offer the best possible teaching so that students learn well and fulfil their potential in terms of exam results. At the same time, we are determined not to sacrifice any of the inclusiveness and humanity which sets Clyst Vale apart from many schools. My well-worn tripod analogy is relevant here: we could provide the best teaching ever, but without good support from home and a good engaged attitude from students themselves individuals may still not reach their potential. We all need to encourage and challenge our students to genuinely do their best. One key priority for us is to improve student attendance, and we made very good progress last year: we are just about in line with national figures, and below them for “persistent absentees”. Parents’ role in this is critical, keeping your offspring hale and hearty and encouraging them out of the door every morning! We have had to be quite forceful with a minority of families, especially over term-time holiday absence, but hope that you understand that this has been entirely necessary. Students need to be in school to make progress.

I am delighted to introduce the following new colleagues, and to wish them every success at Clyst Vale whatever their role and however long they stay here. In traditional alphabetical order, we welcome Kate Borgen-Davis (English), Emma Bullock (Exams Assistant), Julie Chadband (Counsellor), Ben Cooksley (Science), Catherine Hall (English), Sara Jacobs (Deputy Principal), Ondrej Krasko (Food Technology), Maria Montoya (Spanish with French), Dominic Stapleton (PE), Sue Voysey (Principal's PA), and Andy Workman (Head of Digital Media).

There have also been one or two important changes in senior leadership. You will see above that Mrs Sara Jacobs has joined us from Uffculme School to be my Deputy; Mr Paul Sutton is my other Deputy Principal. Mr Allen Bailey has joined the senior team, which is completed by Mrs Ann Hopkins (College Manager). Miss Meghan McConnachie has replaced Mr Bailey as Head of Yellow School. Another important development is that Mrs Viv Oldfield (who continues as Head of English) has an additional role in coordinating our work with Priority Learners (our name for "disadvantaged learners").

One leaver to mention: former student and latterly premises staff colleague Ben Burridge has moved on to another post after four years working at Clyst Vale. We all wish him well.

Traffic News (and Car Parks)

Usually at this time of year it's fairly chaotic at the start and end of the day, and I have to write a big telling-off paragraph to parents who drive in their children. I don't want to tempt fate, but it seems much, much better this year, so many thanks and no telling-off! The only bits of advice worth contemplating are that we really do not want parents to use the staff car park for drop-off or pick-up, unless the child has a disability or significant injury, for example a broken ankle or leg). End of the day pick ups can only really be done at the Sports Hall end. If students can wait on site until even 3.45 then pick-ups become magically easier.

School Buses

Just to reassure Year 7 students and parents, the buses never leave before 3.30, so students have ten minutes to get to the coach park. We always have several staff on duty, the buses have notices saying "CV1" etc, and we are very alert to students who can't find their bus. It is exceptionally rare that a student misses their bus, and of course we would contact you in such circumstances.

Uniform

Is currently magnificent. The students look great, a real credit to themselves, to you, and the College. Year by year, the grumbles over uniform become more and more minor. Last term's white-trimmed shoes have disappeared, and the only things really worth mentioning are – seriously – socks. Black, white and navy blue (similar to the jumper colour) are fine: red, yellow, polkadot and the rest of the rainbow are not. There is the perennial problem of boys not tucking in their shirts, of course. Clyst Vale has always tried to be reasonable over uniform and we are aware of the cost: there are no blazers, for example. Trousers from any retailer are fine, provided that they meet the specified standards. As above, the support and cooperation of parents and carers in this is very important and much appreciated. Please note the information about trouser riveting elsewhere on the Newsletter: we thought about riveting shorts as well, but decided that the vast majority of “proper” tailored shorts won't have patch pockets and provided they're not combat shorts or sports shorts they should all be fine; another example of Clyst Vale common sense.

Funding

Regular readers will know that I have been fairly grumpy about education funding levels, and fed up with continually having to decide on “least worst” spending decisions which will save money but have the least impact on students; even so, like most schools, we have lost staffing, lost one or two option subjects, and have seen class sizes increase. So, the recent announcement of a £14bn increase in funding for schools over the next three years, including £2.6bn next year is obviously very welcome, whether or not you think it is electioneering on the part of the Government. For us, this could make a difference of over £250,000 per year once the complex funding formulae have done their work. We won't see the money until “next year”, though, and although I am trying very hard not to sound ungrateful, will not make up for the funding lost since 2010 or the lost opportunities for students as a result of less funding during that period.



Food Hero Courgette




Courgettes are a great source of Potassium and are great for your heart, making it a great Food Hero for September! We even have a range of recipe ideas including salads and roast accompaniments.

- Travel, from Clyst Vale to resort, and return journey (luxury coach fitted with seat belts), plus ferry, together with use of coach whilst in resort
- Ski lessons (morning and afternoon for six days)
- Hire of skis, boots and poles
- Full area lift pass
- Full insurance (including 24 hour Medicare, ski breakage and snow guarantee)
- Full-board accommodation, including hot lunch on the slopes
- Après-ski activities, such as ice-skating, tubing, ski test and presentation evening
- Clyst Vale ski hooded sweatshirt

Behaviour and achievement points will be taken into consideration prior to students being accepted on this trip.



School Transport

1. Clyst Vale supports the (DCC) Devon County Council's "No Pass No Travel Scheme" that operates on transport to and from this College.
2. Only students who show a valid travel pass to the driver **on every journey** will be allowed to travel. Students must travel on the vehicle indicated on their pass.
3. **Please ensure that your child has their travel pass before they leave home every day.**
4. Please ensure that your child knows what to do in the event they are not allowed to travel or the bus does not arrive (e.g. because of breakdown or traffic conditions or severe weather). College attendance is very important and it is best to be prepared for any of these eventualities.
5. DCC will carry out regular pass checks throughout the year.
6. Drivers are not allowed to carry passengers who cannot show a valid pass.
7. If your child loses their pass during the day they should go to the AtHoS offices to ask for a 10 day temporary pass. Replacement passes cost £5 each and can be ordered online, or by sending a cheque with a replacement form.

COLLEGE DRESS

Clyst Vale aims to maintain a simple pattern of College dress to promote a clear sense of identity and enable students to come sensibly dressed, at reasonable cost, for a range of learning activities. If a student is improperly dressed, correct uniform will be provided for that day or the student may be sent home to change his/her clothing, at the discretion of the Principal. **If parents are in any doubt about the suitability of an item of uniform they should check with the College before buying it.**

Uniform for all students in Years 7 to 11

- White collared shirt
- School colour tie
- Clyst Vale V-neck jumper with College logo.
- Boys trousers - Banner Slimbridge (Black)/Banner Falmouth (Black).
- Girls trousers - Trutex GTN (2 pocket black)/David Luke DL965 black).
- **All trousers must have Clyst Vale logo rivet on waistband.**
- Skirts - Blue Tartan and knee length
- Trutex Senior stitched down/Taylor Tartan (blue) skirt and may be worn no more than 2" above the knee. Knee length black tailored shorts may be worn.
- Black sturdy shoes or **all black** trainers.
- White socks or black tights with skirts.
- Clyst Vale reversible jacket or other outdoor coat.

All uniform and PE Kit can be purchased from Thomas Moore, Exeter. Thomas Moore offers both a personal service in their shop and also the opportunity to order on line at www.thomasmooretoymaster.co.uk.

- Eyebrow jewellery, facial, tongue, nose and lip studs are not permitted.
- Leather jackets, all denim garments and all hoodies are not permitted.
- Hats should not be worn indoors.
- Outer coats should be predominantly plain in colour and without large logos.
- A plain white t-shirt or vest may be worn under the shirt.
- On health and safety grounds, shoes should be appropriate for a work place. Flipflops, open toes, Uggs, Dr Martens (or equivalent) are not permitted.
- Jewellery may be worn, providing it is not excessive or potentially hazardous. However, it is a legal requirement that all jewellery must be removed before undertaking sporting activities. It is the responsibility of the wearer to do this.

The Principal, in consultation with the Governors of the College, will decide on the suitability of the appearance of a student attending the College - extreme hair styles, of either cut or colour, are not permitted.
