Post-16 Open Evening

This is being held on Thursday 10th November, starting at 6.00 pm. There will be talks from Mrs Dormand, Head of Post-16, and subject teachers of all our Post-16 courses available for a more detailed conversation. If you regularly follow our website you will see that we have some fantastic students, achievements and opportunities through our Sixth Form!

University of Exeter Lifestyles Survey

In the week before half-term the University of Exeter Lifestyles Survey held focus workshops with 16 Year 7 students and 13 Year 8 students. All students in both year groups had previously completed a quick questionnaire. Thank you very much to those students (and parents) who took part in the focus groups; we are pleased to have been able to help with this research which will ultimately shed more light on young people's health and wellbeing.

CATs

Next week Year 7 students will perform NFER Cognitive Ability Tests. These are on-line tests in verbal, non-verbal and numerical skills. There is nothing to be worried about. The CATs help us identify students' ability levels a little more accurately when taken in conjunction with Key Stage 2 information. They are also of some benefit as a predictive tool for outcomes, although this is much stronger at the cohort than the individual level.

Ghostly Tales

Hopefully there will be a packed house on Tuesday evening (8th) at the Barnfield Theatre, when Clyst Vale students from across the age range will be putting on an evening of dramatized Ghostly Tales. The connecting theme, other than the supernatural, is that these tales fit broadly into the genre of Victorian drama and melodrama. We have a superb reputation for performing arts, so well worth going! Please note that tickets are available directly from the theatre, not the College.

Anxiety

Anxiety and teenage mental health is scarcely out of the news, with numbers rising, increased awareness, and better diagnosis. This week Childline reported a 35% increase in calls compared to last year, with a rapidly increasing trend of young people becoming anxious – or adding to other anxieties - from stories on the media and discussions on social media. Callers to Childline are reporting worries about ISIS, terrorist attacks elsewhere in the world, the negativity on both sides of the Brexit debate, and the USA presidential election. In response, Childline have developed a "Worried about the World" webpage on www.childline.org.uk/info-advice/your-feelings/anxiety-stress-panic/worries-about-the-world which may be of interest to some students and parents.

Staff Changes

I'm sure parents and students will be delighted to learn that in the week before half-term Mrs Wakefield gave birth to a boy. Clearly, she is now on maternity leave and we are pleased to welcome Mrs Sophie Walton as her replacement; Mrs Walton has several years' teaching experience, mostly at Eggbuckland. We also welcome Mrs Sophie Allen as Facilities Manager; and Mr James Darke has replaced Mr Arkell as teacher of Music as the latter has secured full-time work in Somerset.

Uniform

When is a coat not a coat? When it is a hoody...... Actually, uniform is very good at the moment, but inevitably the colder weather requires an extra layer. So, once again, I am asking parents to ensure that any coat for College looks like a coat and is made of coat material. 
Ten Tors 5-7 May 2017

School Transport

- 1. Clyst Vale supports the (DCC) Devon County Council's "No Pass No Travel Scheme" that operates on transport to and from this College.
- 2. Only students who show a valid travel pass to the driver **on every journey** will be allowed to travel. Students must travel on the vehicle indicated on their pass.
- 3. Please ensure that your child has their travel pass before they leave home every day.
- 4. Please ensure that your child knows what to do in the event they are not allowed to travel or the bus does not arrive (e.g. because of breakdown or traffic conditions or severe weather). College attendance is very important and it is best to be prepared for any of these eventualities.
- 5. DCC will carry out regular pass checks throughout the year.
- 6. Drivers are not allowed to carry passengers who cannot show a valid pass.
- 7. If your child loses their pass during the day they should go to the AtHoS offices to ask for a 10 day temporary pass. Replacement passes cost £5 each and can be ordered online, or by sending a cheque with a replacement form.

COLLEGE DRESS

Clyst Vale aims to maintain a simple pattern of College dress to promote a clear sense of identity and enable students to come sensibly dressed, at reasonable cost, for a range of learning activities. If a student is improperly dressed, correct uniform will be provided for that day or the student may be sent home to change his/her clothing, at the discretion of the Principal.

If parents are in any doubt about the suitability of an item of uniform they should check with the College before buying it.

Uniform for all Students in Years 7 to 11

- White collared shirt.
- · School colour tie.
- Clyst Vale V-neck jumper with School colour logo.
- Trousers should be plain, black, formal and full length. This means no jeans, leggings, chinos or any trousers with rivets or studs. Trousers must be worn on the waist.
- Skirts should be plain black, and may be worn just above the knee. Skirts must be A-line or straight, but not stretchy or "skater" style.
- Knee length black tailored shorts may be worn in the summer.
- Black sturdy shoes or all black trainers.
- Clyst Vale reversible jacket or other outdoor coat.

Main uniform can be purchased from SWI online shop or Thomas Moore.

PE kit is only available from SWI online shop.

The reversible jacket is only available from Thomas Moore.

- Eyebrow jewellery, facial, tongue, nose and lip studs are not permitted.
- Leather jackets, all denim garments and all hoodies are not permitted.
- · Hats should not be worn indoors.
- Outer coats should be predominantly plain in colour and without large logos.
- A plain white t-shirt or vest may be worn under the shirt.
- On health and safety grounds, shoes should be appropriate for a work place. Flipflops, open toes, Uggs, Dr Martens (or equivalent) are not permitted.
- Jewellery may be worn, providing it is not excessive or potentially hazardous. However, it is a legal requirement that all jewellery must be removed before undertaking sporting activities. It is the responsibility of the wearer to do this.

The Principal, in consultation with the Governors of the College, will decide on the suitability of the appearance of a student attending the College – extreme hair styles, of either cut or colour, are not permitted.
