

Year 11 Mocks

These have gone very well. Students' punctuality has been excellent, and the observation of exam room rules – which are far stricter than any school's rules – has also been excellent. Clearly, my colleagues are up to their necks in marking as I write, so results will not be known until next week, but I am delighted to report that the processes went very in this "rehearsal". There have been one or two incidents of poor behaviour just before or after exams by a small group of boys, which won't be happening in the summer as it's unfair on other candidates.

Winter Reminders

Today Devon may see its first snow flurries of the winter (if you're high up on Dartmoor), so it's timely to issue our standard advice.

Extreme Weather:- My first point is that Clyst Vale hardly ever closes (five and a half days in sixteen years). If indeed the snows come (!), the two reliable sources of information are the College website front page, and (if we do close or part-close) local radio; please do not rely on social media, especially your child's social media! The "rules" on school transport are that if the buses can get your children to school in the morning, they are contractually obliged to get them home again in the afternoon. This does not apply to Stagecoach.

Road Safety. Students walking on unlit lanes, and students cycling to College need to be seen to be safe. Cyclists must also wear a helmet.

Colds and stomach bugs:- Please reinforce messages about basic prevention through hand-washing and disposal of tissues; if a child has a sickness or diarrhoea "episode", standard advice is to keep them at home for 48 hours after the last "episode".

Uniform:- Coats, please; not hoodies. There are many ways to keep warm without a hoody.

Human Rights Day

Our amazing student Amnesty International group coordinated by Miss Watt run two large human rights events each year, in December near the date of the signing of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, and in the summer term. On Thursday there will be a hot chocolate and cake sale at break and lunch; the staff band will perform and there will be a mini talent show. There will also be the completion of the mural started last summer term as part of the Marsh Charity Award. This means that we will be joined by the Primary School Human Rights Ambassadors for the day, which is a great example of working with our local schools. The human rights events have a very serious and educational message, chosen by the Amnesty Group, and this event's focus will be on the Rohingya Muslims in Myanmar (Burma) who live under a form of apartheid and are facing genocide. Since August, nearly 700,000 people – mostly Rohingya – have fled Myanmar to nearby Bangladesh. In fact, more Rohingya refugees fled to Bangladesh in the space of three weeks recently than the total number of people who fled by sea to Europe in 2016.

Gardening Club: a Token Gesture

Actually, we need more than a token gesture – we need everyone to shop at their local Tesco in the New Year! A little while ago, the College's greenhouse was condemned and removed; it was so old that I think it was here during the war and the rest of the College built on to it. Thanks to the inspiration of Dr John King, our senior science technician, the Clyst Vale Gardening Club have been accepted on to Tesco's "bags of help" grant scheme. This is the scheme whereby you're given a token when you've shopped, and you put it into one of three containers to "vote" for a project. Let's hope we're not up against very cute children or fluffy animals.... If we win the vote, we can replace the greenhouse, purchase tools and plants, buy an incubator (for fluffy chicks), and provide opportunities for young people to engage with gardening. Voting will take place from Tuesday 2nd January 2018 to Wednesday 28th February 2018 in Exeter branches of Tesco (Cowick St, Metro, Sidwell St, Exe Vale, Exwick, Exminster and Heavitree).

Students who walk or cycle from Clyst Vale to Pinhoe should be alert and ideally go in pairs or small groups. There have been two separate reports of a man acting strangely in the past few days. He is an older man, balding with a grey-looking beard. His appearance is that of a rough sleeper. He has been seen between West Clyst and Broadclyst, on the main road, including the small orchard at the entrance to Dog Village. He has shouted out comments, which is upsetting and alarming. Naturally, we contacted the Police, who have been patrolling to look out for him without success; he may have moved on. Their view is that he is trying to frighten rather than is dangerous (although neither is acceptable), but asked us to alert parents to make appropriate arrangements and reinforce safety advice. Clearly, if he is seen again or if you have any useful information, please do not hesitate to contact us or directly to the Police.

School Transport

- 1. Clyst Vale supports the (DCC) Devon County Council's "No Pass No Travel Scheme" that operates on transport to and from this College.
- 2. Only students who show a valid travel pass to the driver **on every journey** will be allowed to travel. Students must travel on the vehicle indicated on their pass.
- 3. Please ensure that your child has their travel pass before they leave home every day.
- 4. Please ensure that your child knows what to do in the event they are not allowed to travel or the bus does not arrive (e.g. because of breakdown or traffic conditions or severe weather). College attendance is very important and it is best to be prepared for any of these eventualities.
- 5. DCC will carry out regular pass checks throughout the year.
- 6. Drivers are not allowed to carry passengers who cannot show a valid pass.
- If your child loses their pass during the day they should go to the AtHoS offices to ask for a 10 day temporary pass. Replacement passes cost £5 each and can be ordered online, or by sending a cheque with a replacement form.

COLLEGE DRESS

Clyst Vale aims to maintain a simple pattern of College dress to promote a clear sense of identity and enable students to come sensibly dressed, at reasonable cost, for a range of learning activities. If a student is improperly dressed, correct uniform will be provided for that day or the student may be sent home to change his/her clothing, at the discretion of the Principal.

If parents are in any doubt about the suitability of an item of uniform they should check with the College before buying it.

Uniform for all Students in Years 7 to 11

- White collared shirt.
- School colour tie.
- Clyst Vale V-neck jumper with School colour logo.
- Trousers should be plain, black, formal and full length. This means no jeans, leggings, chinos or any trousers with rivets or studs. Trousers must be worn on the waist.
- Skirts should be plain black, and may be worn just above the knee. Skirts must be A-line or straight, but not stretchy or "skater" style.
- Knee length black tailored shorts may be worn in the summer.
- Black sturdy shoes or <u>all black</u> trainers.
- Clyst Vale reversible jacket or other outdoor coat.

Main uniform, PE kit and reversible jacket can be purchased from Thomas Moore.

- Eyebrow jewellery, facial, tongue, nose and lip studs are not permitted.
- Leather jackets, all denim garments and all hoodies are not permitted.
- Hats should not be worn indoors.
- Outer coats should be predominantly plain in colour and without large logos.
- A plain white t-shirt or vest may be worn under the shirt.
- On health and safety grounds, shoes should be appropriate for a work place. Flipflops, open toes, Uggs, Dr Martens (or equivalent) are not permitted.
- Jewellery may be worn, providing it is not excessive or potentially hazardous. However, it is a legal requirement that all jewellery must be removed before undertaking sporting activities. It is the responsibility of the wearer to do this.

The Principal, in consultation with the Governors of the College, will decide on the suitability of the appearance of a student attending the College – extreme hair styles, of either cut or colour, are not permitted.
