Another busy old week!

Transition

Last week's three transition days met their prime objective, which is to make sure that the majority of pupils are confident and excited about starting here in September. Tuesday was one of the very best SD&FoF we have ever had. Without exception, these days are always very good, so it's difficult to explain why some just "feel" better. I think it boils down to the relationships, attitudes and behaviours of students and staff. It was Sports Day, so it was competitive, with long-standing records broken, Yellow School delirious with their overall victory, but it was competitive in the right spirit. Although there are spots during the day when students are not active, there was no poor behaviour. The organisation ran incredibly smoothly, everything from races to field events to the other sports to the BBQ, and my colleagues deserve huge praise for making it so. The music was also excellent, with established performers and emerging talent contributing to the day. Even the weather was kind: it was hot in the morning, but clouded over in the afternoon; students coped brilliantly (with parental planning), and I don't think there was a single beetroot-faced child turning up on Wednesday morning.

Next Week

We don't run an "Activities Week" in the same way that some schools do, but there are so many trips and activities next week that there are strong similarities. Clearly, there will be widely varying numbers of students in College on any given day, and certain key members of staff will also be absent for differing amounts of time. For example, Mr Pearce (Green School) is in Bude, while Mrs Grant (Red School AtHoS) is accompanying the Paris Trip; therefore pastoral issues might be picked up by someone else. Another issue is food at break and lunchtime: the Giraffe House serveries will be closed, and to avoid excessive food waste there will be a slight reduction in the range of hot and cold food offered. In terms of lessons, some year groups will have normal timetable with reduced class sizes (Years 7 and 9), while Year 8 will have a different timetable of activities which are designed to be very different from normal lessons, and hopefully some fun as the rest of the Year Group are in Bude!

This was an excellent and well-supported inter-School competition in advance of the "real thing" in the autumn. <u>Clyst Vale Inter-School Girls Touch Rugby World Cup</u>

Throughout all of last week, girls across all three schools competed for 16 various teams based on the countries representing at the Rugby World Cup 2019 in Japan, later this year.

The tournament is designed to integrate all girls in their respective School from Year 7 through to 10 and follows previously successful events such as RWC 15', Euro's 2016, Champions Trophy Cricket 2017 and Football World Cup 2018.

Girls rugby, at both contact and touch/tag level has a very strong reputation and history at Clyst Vale, with the tournament offering an opportunity for the girls to get involved in the game again or for the very first time.

The girls started the competition on Monday 1 July, with the turnout being excellent. The opening ceremony and first game settled the girls into the tournament well, with Tuesday bringing about the final two group games, to determine the top two in the group that would progress to the Quarter-Finals on Wednesday.

Green School made up four of the eight teams progressing, with Ireland and Argentina winning their groups without a loss and Fiji and Italy finishing runners up and progressing too. Red School had group winners in Japan and runners up in Tonga and Russia. Yellow School had the sole representation, very different to the boys only a week earlier, with New Zealand getting through undefeated.

- Full area lift pass
- Full insurance (including 24 hour Medicare, ski breakage and snow guarantee)
- Full-board accommodation, including hot lunch on the slopes
- Après-ski activities, such as ice-skating, tubing, ski test and presentation evening
- Clyst Vale ski hooded sweatshirt

Behaviour and achievement points will be taken into consideration prior to students being accepted on this trip.







School Transport

- 1. Clyst Vale supports the (DCC) Devon County Council's "No Pass No Travel Scheme" that operates on transport to and from this College.
- 2. Only students who show a valid travel pass to the driver **on every journey** will be allowed to travel. Students must travel on the vehicle indicated on their pass.
- 3. Please ensure that your child has their travel pass before they leave home every day.
- 4. Please ensure that your child knows what to do in the event they are not allowed to travel or the bus does not arrive (e.g. because of breakdown or traffic conditions or severe weather). College attendance is very important and it is best to be prepared for any of these eventualities.
- 5. DCC will carry out regular pass checks throughout the year.
- 6. Drivers are not allowed to carry passengers who cannot show a valid pass.
- 7. If your child loses their pass during the day they should go to the AtHoS offices to ask for a 10 day temporary pass. Replacement passes cost £5 each and can be ordered online, or by sending a cheque with a replacement form.

COLLEGE DRESS

Clyst Vale aims to maintain a simple pattern of College dress to promote a clear sense of identity and enable students to come sensibly dressed, at reasonable cost, for a range of learning activities. If a student is improperly dressed, correct uniform will be provided for that day or the student may be sent home to change his/her clothing, at the discretion of the Principal. If parents are in any doubt about the suitability of an item of uniform they should check with the College before buying it.

Uniform for all students in Years 7 to 11

- White collared shirt
- School colour tie
- Clyst Vale V-neck jumper with College logo.
- Boys trousers Banner Slimbridge (Black)/Banner Falmouth (Black).
- Girls trousers Trutex GTN (2 pocket black)/David Luke DL965 black).
- All trousers must have Clyst Vale logo rivet on waistband.
- Skirts Blue Tartan and knee length
- Trutex Senior stitched down/Taylor Tartan (blue) skirt and may be worn no more than 2" above the knee. Knee length black tailored shorts may be worn.
- Black sturdy shoes or all black trainers.
- White socks or black tights with skirts.
- Clyst Vale reversible jacket or other outdoor coat.

All uniform and PE Kit can be purchased from Thomas Moore, Exeter. Thomas Moore offers both a personal service in their shop and also the opportunity to order on line at www.thomasmooretoymaster.co.uk.

- Eyebrow jewellery, facial, tongue, nose and lip studs are not permitted.
- Leather jackets, all denim garments and all hoodies are not permitted.
- Hats should not be worn indoors.
- Outer coats should be predominantly plain in colour and without large logos.
- A plain white t-shirt or vest may be worn under the shirt.
- On health and safety grounds, shoes should be appropriate for a work place. Flipflops, open toes, Uggs, Dr Martens (or equivalent) are not permitted.
- Jewellery may be worn, providing it is not excessive or potentially hazardous. However, it is a legal requirement that all jewellery must be removed before undertaking sporting activities. It is the responsibility of the wearer to do this.

The Principal, in consultation with the Governors of the College, will decide on the suitability of the appearance of a student attending the College - extreme hair styles, of either cut or colour, are not permitted.
