Dear Parents/Carers,

Year 10 Parents Information Evening

Thank you to parents and students who attended on Tuesday. The powerpoint presentations from Mr Green and Mrs Oldfield can be found on the website under "Examinations" (or will be shortly). Key points are that 60% of 2-year GCSE courses is completed in Year 10, so it's important to not just rely on working hard in Year 11; the move to end-of-course exams and less coursework in practical subjects means a greater emphasis on good notes and good memory techniques, as well as more testing. There are still one or two exams in Year 10, the first one being a BTec PE assessment in December; we will be issuing exam rules and expectations guidance to Year 10 shortly after halfterm.

Year 7 "Meet the Tutor" Evening

And thank you to parents and carers who attended yesterday (Thursday). I was very pleased with the feedback as parents left; it certainly seems that the majority have made the transition from Primary very smoothly and successfully, and are settling in well. Inevitably, there are some individual concerns and worries, and that's why we hold the evening: it's an opportunity to discuss them face-to-face early in the year so that we can do our best to support. For both this event and the Year 10 evening, if you have any suggestions as to how we could improve them, please let us know.

Education Funding

Earlier today (Friday) I sent all parents and carers the latest letter from the WorthLess? campaign, so I do not need to repeat it here. I expect you'll be as irritated as I was to learn from a County finance consultation event that for 2019-20 Devon's children will be funded by central government at £304 per pupil below the national average (it's currently £286).

Students Out and About

Thirty girls attended a special schools event at the WOW Exhibition at the Phoenix Theatre on Thursday (and some appeared on Spotlight at 10.30 pm!). This was a day to celebrate female achievement and to encourage selfconfidence: there is a more detailed and much more eloquent report on the website! The day before another group of Year 10 students attended a BT "Boot Camp"; this is an activity run annually by BT which focuses on a whole range of business-related skills and attributes, the main task being to improve a fairly standard object using IT, and market it. Many thanks to my colleagues Mrs Beer, Ms Brotherton, Mrs Bennett and Miss McConnachie for providing these opportunities.

Ten Tors and Duke of Edinburgh Award

48 students attended the initial meeting earlier this week, which is very encouraging. Miss Barratt and Mr Eales are combining the early stages of Ten Tors training with DofE practice expeditions, and of course some students will be keen to do both. The timing of Ten Tors 2019 is very unfortunate, as it is the weekend immediately prior to the first big week of GCSE exams.

Deep Learning Day

Our first "DLD" of the year will be on Tuesday. For new readers, these are sometimes called "impact days" and the normal timetable is suspended so that each year group can engage in a day of deeper learning about one topic or theme, which is particularly valuable supporting our C42 and Careers programmes. The timetable collapse also means that trips can run without too much disruption. Next week will include deeper Maths or a Language-themed day for Year 7; a Literacy-based day for Year 8 including a rap contest; a development day for Year 9 using simulations to understand better the challenges in less developed countries; a Careers-focused day for Year 10; a split programme of study skills and safeguarding for Year 11; while Sixth Formers will go to the hard-hitting "Learn to Live" safety day run by the emergency services.

Buses

Two things: firstly, we have had a little spate of CV buses being late both morning and evening. Clearly, we're not happy about this, and report every instance of more than a couple of minutes (there's always roadworks somewhere near here, and the lanes are narrow). There has been some concern that if a bus arrives late in the morning, students will be marked late. This is categorically NOT the case. If a student is genuinely late because of school transport, this is out of their control and they are not marked late.

The second thing is behaviour. Most bus journeys are absolutely fine, and there are good relationships between students and drivers. All it takes is a small number of students, even just one, to make the journey miserable by poor behaviour. If students are messing around and your son/daughter feels uncomfortable, we would like to know. If any of the behaviours are potentially dangerous or distracting to the driver, we really would like to know.

Rough Play

When the weather breaks, over-exuberant rough play on the field generally stops until about May. However, we are having too much of it at the moment. It's mostly boys, mostly Years 8 and 9, and almost always within friendship groups, so it's not usually bullying. Most of it is not malicious, but thoughtless; clearly when it is malicious or dangerous we will act, including fixed-term exclusion. Staff on duty intervene frequently, as prevention is better than cure.

Uniform

The new uniform has been so successful and well-observed by students and parents that I have almost missed moaning about it in the Newsletter! Just a reminder, really: the weather is getting colder, so please encourage your son/daughter to wear a jumper (CVCC only!) and a proper coat. Hoodies are not proper coats.

Late News: so proud of you, Mia

Hats off (or in her case, probably on) to Mia Hart (Year 12) who volunteered to take part in Macmillan's "Brave the Shave", and essentially had her hair cut off! This is an incredibly courageous thing to do, entirely selfless, and we estimate will raise around £1000 for Macmillan Cancer Relief. What a fantastic citizen! There will be more next week and on the website. It is possible to donate on-line through the Macmillan Brave the Shave website; search on Mia's name.






October Marketing BULLETIN

School Transport

- 1. Clyst Vale supports the (DCC) Devon County Council's "No Pass No Travel Scheme" that operates on transport to and from this College.
- 2. Only students who show a valid travel pass to the driver **on every journey** will be allowed to travel. Students must travel on the vehicle indicated on their pass.
- 3. Please ensure that your child has their travel pass before they leave home every day.
- 4. Please ensure that your child knows what to do in the event they are not allowed to travel or the bus does not arrive (e.g. because of breakdown or traffic conditions or severe weather). College attendance is very important and it is best to be prepared for any of these eventualities.
- 5. DCC will carry out regular pass checks throughout the year.
- 6. Drivers are not allowed to carry passengers who cannot show a valid pass.
- 7. If your child loses their pass during the day they should go to the AtHoS offices to ask for a 10 day temporary pass. Replacement passes cost £5 each and can be ordered online, or by sending a cheque with a replacement form.

COLLEGE DRESS FROM SEPTEMBER 2018

Clyst Vale aims to maintain a simple pattern of College dress to promote a clear sense of identity and enable students to come sensibly dressed, at reasonable cost, for a range of learning activities. If a student is improperly dressed, correct uniform will be provided for that day or the student may be sent home to change his/her clothing, at the discretion of the Principal. If parents are in any doubt about the suitability of an item of uniform they should check with the College before buying it.

Uniform for all students in Years 7 to 11

- White collared shirt
- School colour tie
- Clyst Vale V-neck jumper with College logo.
- Boys trousers Banner Slimbridge (Black)/Banner Falmouth (Black).
- Girls trousers Trutex GTN (2 pocket black)/David Luke DL965 black).
- All trousers must have Clyst Vale logo rivet on waistband.
- Skirts Blue Tartan.
- Trutex Senior stitched down/Taylor Tartan (blue) skirt and may be worn no more than 2" above the knee. Knee length black tailored shorts may be worn in the summer.
- Black sturdy shoes or all black trainers.
- White socks or black tights with skirts.
- Clyst Vale reversible jacket or other outdoor coat.

All uniform and PE Kit can be purchased from Thomas Moore, Exeter. Thomas Moore offers both a personal service in their shop and also the opportunity to order on line at www.thomasmooretoymaster.co.uk.

- Eyebrow jewellery, facial, tongue, nose and lip studs are not permitted.
- Leather jackets, all denim garments and all hoodies are not permitted.
- Hats should not be worn indoors.
- Outer coats should be predominantly plain in colour and without large logos.
- A plain white t-shirt or vest may be worn under the shirt.
- On health and safety grounds, shoes should be appropriate for a work place. Flipflops, open toes, Uggs, Dr Martens (or equivalent) are not permitted.
- Jewellery may be worn, providing it is not excessive or potentially hazardous. However, it is a legal requirement that all jewellery must be removed before undertaking sporting activities. It is the responsibility of the wearer to do this.

The Principal, in consultation with the Governors of the College, will decide on the suitability of the appearance of a student attending the College - extreme hair styles, of either cut or colour, are not permitted.
