Year 8 Parents Evening

Thank you to Year 8 parents and carers for a healthy attendance of 72% at Tuesday's parents evening. Clearly, the evening is about students' academic progress and the qualities and behaviour that underpins this. There will always be exceptions and individual cases, but our tracking information suggests that Year 8 are on track at the moment. The Year Group is "boy-heavy", which sometimes presents challenges when they reach Years 10 and 11, so it is very important to establish good habits and to maintain good links with home, which is why a good turn-out is always encouraging. Thank you to 58 parents for completing the questionnaire (which is exactly the same as Ofsted's). The scores on the doors (almost literally, thinking about where most parents filled them in) are below. The lowest ranking (albeit 88%) is for appropriate homework, which is something my colleagues will note and take on board in January.

Carol Service

The annual Carol Service will be held in Whimple Church (St Mary's) at 7.00 pm on Monday. You can guarantee that it will be a genuinely lovely and heart-warming event. There is something for everyone: we have some really high-quality musicians and singers; a mix of religious and secular readings; all Year groups represented. And if that's not heart-warming enough, there will be mulled wine afterwards (and mince pies).

Technology

You should have received a free copy of "Digital Parenting" magazine this week, with useful advice and articles about, well, being a parent or carer in these fast-changing digital times. Christmas is a time when students often receive a first or an upgraded electronic item, whether smartphone, console or other; therefore, we always have a push in Spring Term to remind students about keeping themselves safe on the internet. This will include an evening for parents organised by the Parents' Group formerly known as the PTFA. By chance this week, Josh in Year 11 found an old Newsletter from June 2006 tucked in a book; there had been an Ofcom survey finding that 51% of young people had access to a games console, 18% a MP3; average internet usage then was 8 hours per week, with TV watching on average 14 hours per week. Smartphones and mobiles weren't even mentioned, and it is quite a sobering reflection that we thought use of technology was a huge distraction 11 years ago; I haven't any recent figures, but I would imagine that the 2006 figures are now wildly out, especially if "internet use" is extended to include social media. (Mind, 2006 seems like a different age altogether: the same Newsletter indicated that Devon planned to move us lock, stock and barrel to Cranbrook in September 2010.)

Staff Illness

In the last couple of weeks we have had fairly high levels of staff absence; for example there were seven teachers not at the Year 8 Parents' Evening because of illness. There are a lot of upper respiratory conditions such as bronchitis, other chest infections, and laryngitis which have longer recovery times than a routine cough or cold. Clearly, we do our best to manage this; ill teachers will send in work from home and do their best to keep up with marking, and we buy in the best supply teachers we can. However, this is bound to have *some* impact, especially on homework and marking if a teacher is away for more than a couple of days. Also, although most would never admit it, students miss their regular teacher when they're not there.

Year 10: University of York PhD Research

This has gone really well this week, and thanks from my daughter Rosie to all involved. Rosie has been very impressed with our students; especially their ability to turn up on time, politeness, and in many cases a real genuine interest in what the research is about (the links between birth order, theory of mind, and vocational thinking, and how it changes over time; Rosie is conducting the same exercises with the 20-21 age group).

Some Bad Moos to End With

I'm sorry to report that we have had some very destructive and anti-social intruders on site for the past two nights in succession when no one is around to see them. Fortunately, they do not seem to have the manual dexterity needed to gain access to the buildings, but have done some very unpleasant things on the field. We have caught some of them, and apart from a sort of bovine stubbornness, they have cooperated and left peacefully. You've guessed it, we have had night visits from the Community Farm cows, and we are obviously now in urgent discussions about fencing. Our field is currently out of bounds anyway because it's very wet (even wetter now,,,). The serious aspect is that the field will need some attention to level the surface in the worst areas. On the plus side, we have some excellent organic material for the Gardening Club, and our partnership with Ndururumo High School in Kenya taught me that cows are nothing compared to when a hippo eats your whole garden. You don't get things like this happening in Exeter schools......

BT BOOTCAMP 28th November 2017

On November 28th thirty year 10 students travelled to the BT offices for a careers 'bootcamp'. The students were working with employees from BT and an organisation called 'mykindafuture' to develop their knowledge about their future careers. The students discussed their dream jobs, skills they would need to be successful and job descriptions. They were able to make goals for the future and the steps they could take in the short term. The



afternoon involved doing a mock interview for a job with one of the employers where the students practiced the perfect hand shake and body language. We were taken on a tour of the building where we could see how the different



departments worked including cyber security, customer complaints, BT Sport, Open Reach engineering and the Police. Students also had to practice being

involved in an assessment centre activity (a bit like Dragons' Den) where they designed various technological items and presented this to the staff. The students who designed a techno jacket were awarded the prize.

It was also very interesting to hear about the variety of jobs that were available at BT and the advantages of working for a large company.

I received the following personal email from the tutor for the day.

"The CVCC students were fantastic through the day and really engaged with the skills workshop. They communicated with the BT volunteers in a mature way and all of the volunteers fed back how much they enjoyed working with the students. As we discussed, some of the students needed to raise their expectations of themselves and I really feel through the day we were able to have an impact and broaden the students' ambitions. I hope the students follow up on the skills they learnt and I wish them every success in the next part of their journey towards an exciting career."

School Transport

- 1. Clyst Vale supports the (DCC) Devon County Council's "No Pass No Travel Scheme" that operates on transport to and from this College.
- 2. Only students who show a valid travel pass to the driver **on every journey** will be allowed to travel. Students must travel on the vehicle indicated on their pass.
- 3. Please ensure that your child has their travel pass before they leave home every day.
- 4. Please ensure that your child knows what to do in the event they are not allowed to travel or the bus does not arrive (e.g. because of breakdown or traffic conditions or severe weather). College attendance is very important and it is best to be prepared for any of these eventualities.
- 5. DCC will carry out regular pass checks throughout the year.
- 6. Drivers are not allowed to carry passengers who cannot show a valid pass.
- If your child loses their pass during the day they should go to the AtHoS offices to ask for a 10 day temporary pass. Replacement passes cost £5 each and can be ordered online, or by sending a cheque with a replacement form.

COLLEGE DRESS

Clyst Vale aims to maintain a simple pattern of College dress to promote a clear sense of identity and enable students to come sensibly dressed, at reasonable cost, for a range of learning activities. If a student is improperly dressed, correct uniform will be provided for that day or the student may be sent home to change his/her clothing, at the discretion of the Principal.

If parents are in any doubt about the suitability of an item of uniform they should check with the College before buying it.

Uniform for all Students in Years 7 to 11

- White collared shirt.
- School colour tie.
- Clyst Vale V-neck jumper with School colour logo.
- Trousers should be plain, black, formal and full length. This means no jeans, leggings, chinos or any trousers with rivets or studs. Trousers must be worn on the waist.
- Skirts should be plain black, and may be worn just above the knee. Skirts must be A-line or straight, but not stretchy or "skater" style.
- Knee length black tailored shorts may be worn in the summer.
- Black sturdy shoes or <u>all black</u> trainers.
- Clyst Vale reversible jacket or other outdoor coat.

Main uniform, PE kit and reversible jacket can be purchased from Thomas Moore.

- Eyebrow jewellery, facial, tongue, nose and lip studs are not permitted.
- Leather jackets, all denim garments and all hoodies are not permitted.
- Hats should not be worn indoors.
- Outer coats should be predominantly plain in colour and without large logos.
- A plain white t-shirt or vest may be worn under the shirt.
- On health and safety grounds, shoes should be appropriate for a work place. Flipflops, open toes, Uggs, Dr Martens (or equivalent) are not permitted.
- Jewellery may be worn, providing it is not excessive or potentially hazardous. However, it is a legal requirement that all jewellery must be removed before undertaking sporting activities. It is the responsibility of the wearer to do this.

The Principal, in consultation with the Governors of the College, will decide on the suitability of the appearance of a student attending the College – extreme hair styles, of either cut or colour, are not permitted.
