

Rights Respecting School Award

I am thrilled that we have been recognised as a school committed to promoting human rights for children, and have been approved for the Bronze level of the RRS Award. Credit to Miss Watt for her energetic leadership, supported by Mrs Battishill and a steering group of staff and students. This builds on our long tradition of supporting human rights and challenging injustice, for example the Amnesty International group, and will see a wide range of improvements to many aspects of the College. I have written a separate, more detailed, letter to parents via the gateway.

Annual awards

Because there's so much going on next week, we had to hold our "end-of-year" assembly a week early! A key part of this event is the announcement of the Clyst Vale Annual Awards. It's no coincidence that two of the Awards link directly to being a Rights Respecting School: the Caring Cup and the Citizenship Shield. All of the awards have relevance, though, promoting effort and/or achievement.

The Citizenship Shield has been awarded to Maddy Ross (Y12) for many years in Clyst Vale promoting Amnesty International and human rights, and especially for her campaign which reached the national press about the difficulties facing women cricketers in Devon. This was a great example of "student voice", as well as shining a spotlight on an equality issue.

The Caring Cup has been awarded to Jasmine Daniels (Y10). Jasmine is one of those rare students who will go the extra mile for everyone. She has given so much to the college - entering every competition, volunteering, supporting friends, and Amnesty. Jasmine has also been a strong supporter of the Harry Patch Peace Garden, and gave a wonderful portrait of Sir Nicholas Winton to Lady Milena Grenfell-Baines when she last visited (Winton chartered trains in 1939 to transport 600 Jewish Czech children to safety: Lady Milena was one of the children).

The Spirit of Devon Award is for the student who has made most academic progress from Year 6 SATs to Year 9, and this year the deserving winner is William Blum (Y9).

The Ostler Award for outstanding personal achievement, which generally means at a national level, has been awarded to India Williams (Y9). India will be well known to many of you through the Clyst Vale shows at the Barnfield and elsewhere, as she is an excellent singer, dancer and actor. She deserves the Ostler Award through being accepted after auditions for a third year running to the National Youth Music Theatre, having performed to public audiences in Bury St Edmunds, Kingston and this year in Yorkshire.

The Tolman-May Award is for a student who has not only overcome challenges in their life, but is successful, remains positive when others of us might not be, and is often a role model to others. Previous winners have had special needs, mental health issues, and a serious medical condition. For reasons of confidentiality I am not able to publish the name of this year's winner, who unquestionably meets the criteria, especially that of being positive, cheerful and an example to others.

The "Pope's Challice" award for Performing Arts student of the year goes to Josie Tapp (Y13), who has participated in nearly every show since Year 7, taking principal roles as Cinderella in Into the Woods and Frances in The Battle of Boat. She achieved a starred Distinction in BTEC Level 3 Subsidiary Diploma in Performing Arts. Outside of Clyst Vale, she has played principal roles as Johanna in Sweeney Todd and Christine in Phantom of the Opera. Making her especially deserving of this Award, Josie has a wonderfully supportive and humble nature, an excellent role model to younger students who she has helped to direct and rehearse, and a wonderful asset and ambassador for Clyst Vale.

The Schools Cup

This year the proud winners are Yellow School! The trophy was presented in the end of year assembly to Head Girl Rachel Champion and Head Boy Trenell Campbell. The Schools Cup is awarded to the School which accumulates the most points over the whole year: this includes for example praise points (minus behaviour points), points for inter-tutor competitions in sport and other subjects, and Sports Day points. So, students contribute on a daily basis!

Sports Day and Festival on the Field

Still on the theme of awards, congratulations to Rachel Champion and Ben Parsons for being Victrix and Victor Ludorum on Sports Day (or possibly "Ludorae", my Latin's rusty), and to Green School for their overall win. Our Sports Day is a one-off, and this year's was a particularly good one. For the traditionalists, there was a full complement of track and field events, proper competition, personal bests and records. For those who believe sport should be fun and participatory, there were rounders, archery, BMX-ing, target golf, penalties, and tug-of-war. Even the weather was kind to us, as it had cooled down considerably from the previous hot spell but was still pleasant. Festival on the Field was also a success, showcasing our established performers and introducing some new ones. Sadly, I didn't get to see Festival as someone had put me on toilet duty, but it sounded good. That apart, it was a fantastic day, bringing the whole College together, and many thanks to my colleagues for their superb management, organisation and support.

Year 10 Work Experience

Next week Year 10 embark on a week's work experience. Clyst Vale has always been committed to this as part of our Careers offer, and I was interested to discover that some local schools no longer offer it; in my view, being in an unfamiliar working environment often with unfamiliar adults is worth it in itself in terms of developing character, but an early introduction to work is clearly educational, and at its best inspirational. As always, the arrivals were highly entertaining, and we avoided the traffic congestion we sometimes experience; the students looked absolutely brilliant and gave a strong hint of their grown-up futures; the organisation was superb, thanks mostly to Mrs Turner, Ms Prunty and Mrs Grant; and the best thing of all was the atmosphere, which was everything a good social event should be: happy, relaxed, fun, but not too wild. For most schools, the Prom is a significant rite of passage, and I am delighted for Year 11 that it went so well.

Uniform

I can't believe I'm actually writing this sentence, either, but you should have received a letter about trousers. As you know, we have been heartily fed up with the constant arguments and bad feeling about incorrect school uniform, not to mention the casual attitude often associated with it, so have made an attempt to counter this by specifying limited ranges which are acceptable. Therefore, you should have received a letter about how we will approach this, and how you may get your child's trousers approved and riveted. Excuse the pun, but the bottom line is that we want to end uniform arguments, concentrate on more important issues, and engender some pride in Clyst Vale.

School Transport

- 1. Clyst Vale supports the (DCC) Devon County Council's "No Pass No Travel Scheme" that operates on transport to and from this College.
- 2. Only students who show a valid travel pass to the driver **on every journey** will be allowed to travel. Students must travel on the vehicle indicated on their pass.
- 3. Please ensure that your child has their travel pass before they leave home every day.
- 4. Please ensure that your child knows what to do in the event they are not allowed to travel or the bus does not arrive (e.g. because of breakdown or traffic conditions or severe weather). College attendance is very important and it is best to be prepared for any of these eventualities.
- 5. DCC will carry out regular pass checks throughout the year.
- 6. Drivers are not allowed to carry passengers who cannot show a valid pass.
- If your child loses their pass during the day they should go to the AtHoS offices to ask for a 10 day temporary pass. Replacement passes cost £5 each and can be ordered online, or by sending a cheque with a replacement form.

COLLEGE DRESS

Clyst Vale aims to maintain a simple pattern of College dress to promote a clear sense of identity and enable students to come sensibly dressed, at reasonable cost, for a range of learning activities. If a student is improperly dressed, correct uniform will be provided for that day or the student may be sent home to change his/her clothing, at the discretion of the Principal.

If parents are in any doubt about the suitability of an item of uniform they should check with the College before buying it.

Uniform for all Students in Years 7 to 11

- White collared shirt.
- School colour tie.
- Clyst Vale V-neck jumper with School colour logo.
- Trousers should be plain, black, formal and full length. This means no jeans, leggings, chinos or any trousers with rivets or studs. Trousers must be worn on the waist.
- Skirts should be plain black, and may be worn just above the knee. Skirts must be A-line or straight, but not stretchy or "skater" style.
- Knee length black tailored shorts may be worn in the summer.
- Black sturdy shoes or <u>all black</u> trainers.
- Clyst Vale reversible jacket or other outdoor coat.

Main uniform, PE kit and reversible jacket can be purchased from Thomas Moore.

- Eyebrow jewellery, facial, tongue, nose and lip studs are not permitted.
- Leather jackets, all denim garments and all hoodies are not permitted.
- Hats should not be worn indoors.
- Outer coats should be predominantly plain in colour and without large logos.
- A plain white t-shirt or vest may be worn under the shirt.
- On health and safety grounds, shoes should be appropriate for a work place. Flipflops, open toes, Uggs, Dr Martens (or equivalent) are not permitted.
- Jewellery may be worn, providing it is not excessive or potentially hazardous. However, it is a legal requirement that all jewellery must be removed before undertaking sporting activities. It is the responsibility of the wearer to do this.

The Principal, in consultation with the Governors of the College, will decide on the suitability of the appearance of a student attending the College – extreme hair styles, of either cut or colour, are not permitted.
