

Ofsted

Earlier today you should have received a letter from me accompanying the letter following the Ofsted inspection on 25th April. These were sent out via the College gateway. If you are not on the gateway, a copy will be sent to you via other means. In a nutshell, the College remains "Good". To maintain that judgement, we need to make improvements to the outcomes of disadvantaged learners, Maths, A-levels, and attendance. Particularly pleasing were comments that pupils are safe and feel safe, and that we have a strong culture of safeguarding. The letter will be published "officially" on the Ofsted website next Monday.

Exams

The first week of formal exams has gone well. Students have been prompt and well-behaved in the exam rooms, while other students have adapted to the new routines and are being respectfully calm in the key areas of the College.

Parents' Interest Group: Internet Safety

Wednesday's talk by Gary Gates was hard-hitting and very useful for parents who attended. As well as an update on the latest internet activities and trends, there was helpful advice on staying safe, real-life local examples of grooming and child sexual exploitation via the internet, and some questions about the morality of the games which young people can easily access. The attendance was a little on the thin side, and it would be interesting to know why: light evening, middle of exam season, not enough publicity? For two years running, the parents who attended learned a lot and recommended that we hold this presentation annually. The pace of change can be alarming: it doesn't seem very long since Fortnite burst on the scene; quite apart from the morality of gangs of marauders attacking and robbing others, the first Devon prosecution of a sex offender grooming children through Fortnite occurred a couple of weeks ago. I have attached a useful pdf of social media (from Devon's Early Help 4 Mental Health service), all of which are internet enabled and could in theory pose a risk to children if parental guidance and settings are not enabled.

CIF (Condition Improvement Fund) Update

You may recall that we have been granted £1.4m for roof repairs and to improve fire safety. These are wide-ranging projects which cannot be completed within the summer holiday, and we are anxious that it is all finished before we start again in September. Therefore, *this coming weekend*, contractors will be setting up their compound and erecting scaffolding around the science block, the front of College, and a row of offices adjacent to the playground. We have insisted that this will not affect any fire exit routes; will not affect any of the GCSE and A-level exams; and will not affect teaching. There will be contractors on site during the College day; all will be thoroughly checked under safeguarding procedures. Students will also be given health and safety instructions by tutors.

Ten Tors

Congratulations to "Clyst Vale A" who completed the 35-mile Route D successfully with no alarms or crises. The team made very good time on Saturday, completing seven tors, and finished the route comfortably before lunchtime on Sunday. So well done to Rosie, Laurie, Tom, Gabe, Benedict and Mattie; thanks to helpers Graeme Robb, Finn Manning, Harriet Gilmour, Alex Sanger-Anderson and Harry Price; and a special mention to Chris Eales for his commitment to Ten Tors, coordinating the team, organising training, and accompanying them to Okehampton Camp.

Road Safety

Recently we have had two "near-misses"; in one case a student was not paying enough attention and was clipped by a wing mirror; in the other a car was driving too fast in Station Road and its wing mirror also clipped a student. We remind students about road safety, but it would be helpful if this was reinforced at home. And while I am almost certain the second driver had no connection to Clyst Vale and won't be reading this, it goes without saying that drivers should reduce their speed near schools, approaching a 20 mph zone.

University of Exeter Medical School 'Young Person's Lifestyle Project'.

We are pleased to be working with the University on this project, which focuses on the physical health (physical activity and diet) of students, and how it is promoted. There have been a number of student interviews and focus groups; key staff have also been involved in interviews. The project is now seeking parental input, so next week I will send out a letter with a link to a survey for parents of Year 7 & 8 students. The benefit to Clyst Vale is that we receive useful general feedback.

Bradninch Buses

Over forty of our students live in Bradninch, and most use the Stagecoach 1 service every day. Because of the rail engineering and roadworks at Hele which will last for seven months, this service was to be withdrawn and the students and their families would have had extreme difficulties in getting to Clyst Vale. This was due to start on Monday. Fortunately, at the eleventh hour, there was an outbreak of common sense confirmed by Stagecoach as follows: "Please note that due to the long term disruption to the bus service, the road closure on TTRO1824554, will NOT be commencing on 21st May 2018. Devon County Council cannot permit the road to be closed by Network Rail with no organised bus replacement service in place. The situation will be reviewed on Friday 25th May 2018, for a possible start to the closure on 4th June." Let's hope the solutions found are good ones, and that we know by next Friday so there is no uncertainty on 4th June when 8 of the 44 students travel in for GCSE exams.

Clyst Vale Public Library

One of the things of which I am very proud is that we have fought hard over the years to maintain a dualuse public-school library on site. Devon Library Services adopted charity status a year or so ago, which has helped to sustain the entire service financially. So, I suppose it was inevitable that public libraries would be given a collecting box and a target for charitable donations. Ours is £100 a year. I am always delighted to publicise the Clyst Vale public library, where you can return or order any book in Devon, browse, borrow books, dvds and audio books, and use the computers; but now I need to remind you to bring some loose change as well....

As you can see, it's been a busy week. The weekend looks almost as hectic, with a right royal match to look forward to. I refer, of course, to Exeter Chiefs' semi-final against Newcastle; let's hope they can emulate City's success last night!

School Transport

- 1. Clyst Vale supports the (DCC) Devon County Council's "No Pass No Travel Scheme" that operates on transport to and from this College.
- 2. Only students who show a valid travel pass to the driver **on every journey** will be allowed to travel. Students must travel on the vehicle indicated on their pass.
- 3. Please ensure that your child has their travel pass before they leave home every day.
- 4. Please ensure that your child knows what to do in the event they are not allowed to travel or the bus does not arrive (e.g. because of breakdown or traffic conditions or severe weather). College attendance is very important and it is best to be prepared for any of these eventualities.
- 5. DCC will carry out regular pass checks throughout the year.
- 6. Drivers are not allowed to carry passengers who cannot show a valid pass.
- If your child loses their pass during the day they should go to the AtHoS offices to ask for a 10 day temporary pass. Replacement passes cost £5 each and can be ordered online, or by sending a cheque with a replacement form.

COLLEGE DRESS

Clyst Vale aims to maintain a simple pattern of College dress to promote a clear sense of identity and enable students to come sensibly dressed, at reasonable cost, for a range of learning activities. If a student is improperly dressed, correct uniform will be provided for that day or the student may be sent home to change his/her clothing, at the discretion of the Principal.

If parents are in any doubt about the suitability of an item of uniform they should check with the College before buying it.

Uniform for all Students in Years 7 to 11

- White collared shirt.
- School colour tie.
- Clyst Vale V-neck jumper with School colour logo.
- Trousers should be plain, black, formal and full length. This means no jeans, leggings, chinos or any trousers with rivets or studs. Trousers must be worn on the waist.
- Skirts should be plain black, and may be worn just above the knee. Skirts must be A-line or straight, but not stretchy or "skater" style.
- Knee length black tailored shorts may be worn in the summer.
- Black sturdy shoes or <u>all black</u> trainers.
- Clyst Vale reversible jacket or other outdoor coat.

Main uniform, PE kit and reversible jacket can be purchased from Thomas Moore.

- Eyebrow jewellery, facial, tongue, nose and lip studs are not permitted.
- Leather jackets, all denim garments and all hoodies are not permitted.
- Hats should not be worn indoors.
- Outer coats should be predominantly plain in colour and without large logos.
- A plain white t-shirt or vest may be worn under the shirt.
- On health and safety grounds, shoes should be appropriate for a work place. Flipflops, open toes, Uggs, Dr Martens (or equivalent) are not permitted.
- Jewellery may be worn, providing it is not excessive or potentially hazardous. However, it is a legal requirement that all jewellery must be removed before undertaking sporting activities. It is the responsibility of the wearer to do this.

The Principal, in consultation with the Governors of the College, will decide on the suitability of the appearance of a student attending the College – extreme hair styles, of either cut or colour, are not permitted.
