Dear Parents and Carers

Year 8 Parents Evening

• As always, a big thank you to parents and carers who participated in last night's Parents' Evening. It's a little difficult to generalise as many students will be doing swimmingly well in terms of achievement, attitude and effort, while others need the metaphorical kick. However, my colleagues will have reflected this and given strategies for improvement where necessary. If you were unable to attend, or have any follow-up issues, please don't hesitate to contact your child's teacher(s) or tutor.

Covid and Vaccination Updates

- Vaccination Day on Monday went extremely well, was completed in the day, there were no issues apart from sore arms, and nobody was vaccinated without consent. 160 students received the covid jab many others had already had it over half-term; and over 600 students had the flu vaccination. So, I'm pleased that we have crossed this particular bridge so smoothly. Hopefully this will prevent many cases of both covid, reduce other respiratory infections, and help maintain good attendance levels. There were no "anti-vax" protests beyond a handful of e-mails and letters.
- Currently, there are 15 students isolating including 7 who are awaiting a PCR result. This remains a low total, although after nearly a week of no new cases we have had six on one day. On Monday, all members of staff who have been isolating will have returned.
- Testing: please keep the two-weekly LFT tests going. It's ever so simple more testing means less transmission which means fewer cases which means we can be more "normal", fewer students miss out, and there are lower risks to adults as well.
- Masks: please give your children a mask for school transport and College, and keep reminding/ encouraging/bribing them to wear them. This has gone on for a long time, but is arguably the most effective way of preventing transmission other than medical interventions like vaccination (a world-wide survey concluded this yesterday). Nationally, Public Health have been given more powers to recommend the use of masks in local areas where rates are high; not much change for Devon, then. Rates are above national, and in schools the expectation is that masks stay on (except lessons, and for exempt people).
- Just in case you've missed this, which impacts on some of Year 11 and above: the Joint Committee on Vaccination and Immunisation (JCVI) has advised that all healthy 16 to 17 year olds should be offered a second dose of the Pfizer vaccine, 12 weeks or more following the first vaccine dose, or 12 weeks following a positive COVID-19 test result whichever is later. This will be through vaccination centres, community pharmacies and GP led primary care network sites. The national booking service will be available from Monday 22 November for 16 and 17 year olds.

Exams 2022

• Following on from my comments last week, we have decided that the Year 11 mocks will be used as evidence for teacher grading in the unlikely event of next summer's GCSEs (and Level 2 qualifications) being cancelled. I have written to Year 11 students and parents to this effect. It's not possible for every subject, but many will give over some lesson time next week for revision purposes and to help reduce any slightly increased worry (including mine...). With Year 11 mocks fast-approaching, a quick decision was necessary; we have a little more time for a considered decision for Year 13 who are currently in the throes of coursework and UCAS applications (and any Year 12 thinking about AS entry next summer).

GCSE Certificate Presentation Evening, 25th November

• Still calling all of last year's Year 11! The Presentation Evening is next Thursday, 6.30 pm, in the Main Hall. Please let us know if you're coming so that we can make the organisation near-perfect! It's not just GCSE certificates – there are CVCC certificates, too, for highest achievement and highest progress in each subject, with a financial token of congratulation. It would be great to see you again.

Duke of Edinburgh & Ten Tors

• Near-record numbers of students attending last weekend's training walk on Dartmoor, 48 to be precise. 48 students represent about 5% of the College, but age-limits preclude Years 7 and 8, so it's nearer 10%. This is very encouraging indeed, and says a lot about the positive attitude of these young people. Many thanks to my colleagues and volunteers who supervised and walked – important to remember that outdoor education activities wouldn't happen without them – and to parents/carers who were prepared to transport their children as two minibuses weren't enough. An excellent good news story!

Homework

There has been a flurry of homework questions from students and parents recently, so here is an attempt to clarify the present position and think ahead a little. Before technology and even until a couple of years ago, homework was mostly recorded in Planners, and the submission of homework was either on paper or in exercise books. The advent of e-mail and virtual platforms complicated matters a little in that paperless homework could be submitted on line (although in reality many teachers just printed it off anyway). Then we (and many schools) had the pandemic, lockdown, and a rapid migration to other platforms, Teams in our case. This provides amazing opportunities for homework while simultaneously muddying the waters, and now Edulink is on the horizon, adding to the current situation. I could call this an exhilarating time of transition in which we are exploring new, exciting paradigms for homework to improve the current hybrid model, but not quite my style. At the moment: there should be a reference to every homework set in the Planner, even if it merely says "Latin – see Teams"; this allows parents an easy oversight. On Teams, homework will either be set as an Assignment, or through one of the channels: "General" in most cases, although some teachers have set up an additional "homework" channel.

- The submission of homework is more varied: written in ex books; returned electronically as a Teams assignment; completed as an electronic document and e-mailed/returned through Teams; brought in as a physical artefact; or not submitted but monitored through MyMaths, GCSE Pod or Seneca, for example. To an extent it was ever thus: different subjects have different pedagogies and thereby different homeworks. My colleagues are also aware that not all families have access to the same technology, printers for exampleI think the issue here is clarity for students when the homework is being set, both in class and also in the written instructions.
- We are reviewing homework and investigating Edulink as a future possibility, which would mean another change in platform when not everyone has arrived on this one yet. So, this would not be rushed, and announced well in advance. In the meantime: please check the planner, look at teams, and we will be clear about submission.

Vacancies for Parent Governors.

• A "heads-up" that very shortly Miss Prunty, Clerk to Governors, will be sending out communications about this; we seek nominations and there is an election process. The Governors (or Trustees as they should really be called, and which gives a more accurate flavour of the role) would welcome financial experience or ability to strengthen the skill-set, but this should not deter anyone from putting their name forward.

Site update

• I am informed that the roofing work is now complete, and sections of scaffolding have been taken down. However, the second phase of work, replacing certain ancient, decaying and stuck windows (plus improving ventilation), has barely started and will continue well into the Spring Term. There will need to be re-rooming for certain rooms for short periods, starting next month. Unfortunately, the windows work means that scaffolding remains in place in areas of the site, mostly the main block, and in one or two of the more awkward spots. Students have been incredibly sensible and patient about the work this term, and long may that continue. Also, the contractors have been very good, too, keeping themselves to themselves (I suppose that's easier if you're on a roof all day). It'll be nice when it's finished...

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Rugby Match Reports



Y11 Boys Rugby: Kings School, Ottery 17-10 Clyst Vale

On a pleasant Autumn afternoon, the Y11 lads made the trip over to Kings School in Ottery-St-Mary for their third game of the season. A tightly contested affair ensued for 60 minutes, with a Devon Society Referee taking charge. Clyst Vale kicked off with centre Ned opening proceedings with another well taken individual try, chipping and chasing from 40 metres out. Kings hit back with a try following sustained pressure but Clyst Vale finished the half with a great team try following several phases near the Kings line, with full back Reece diving over. Felix went off after making a strong tackle and was replaced with Paddy in the boiler room of second row, who did a sterling job along with McKenzie who put himself about outstandingly well.

The second half resumed, with Clyst Vale starved of possession but dominating at scrum time, shunting Kings off their ball and winning every scrum that came their way. With the last play coming and Clyst Vale struggling for field position, Josh linked well with Reece from deep to create an attack to leave a two on one on the wing, with Reece's offload to Tom not going to hand and the Kings ten running in an intercept from half way — which was unconverted to leave the final score at 17-10.

Attendance, Absence and Requests for Absence

Please let the College know of any absence on the first day it occurs. If the absence continues beyond the first day, please contact the College on each subsequent day of absence, too. To comply with safeguarding obligations, we cannot simply assume a student's sickness absence is ongoing; we need to be certain that the reason for absence is due to continuing illness.

If you do not notify the College, then we will make contact with you to identify the reason for absence. This is important as it helps to reduce unauthorised absences and truancy.

Please note, the College may ask you to provide medical proof if a student is absent from College due to illness.

Medical Appointments

We encourage students to maximise their levels of attendance; research indicates a direct link between attendance and examination performance. The timing of many medical appointments means that often students can attend school first, and return afterwards. By doing so, students minimise missed learning whilst keeping their attendance levels as high as possible. Therefore, we ask that parents/carers send their child into school for morning registration, even when a medical appointment takes place in the middle of the morning. Similarly, appointments scheduled for the afternoon should, where possible, be arranged after Period 4 - during lunchtime. Students are encouraged to return to school after a lunchtime appointment, if they can.

COLLEGE DRESS

Clyst Vale aims to maintain a simple pattern of College dress to promote a clear sense of identity and enable students to come sensibly dressed, at reasonable cost, for a range of learning activities. If a student is improperly dressed, correct uniform will be provided for that day or the student may be sent home to change his/her clothing, at the discretion of the Principal. If parents are in any doubt about the suitability of an item of uniform they should check with the College before buying it.

Uniform for all students in Years 7 to 11

- White collared shirt
- School colour tie
- Clyst Vale V-neck jumper with College logo.
- Boys trousers Banner Slimbridge (Black)/Banner Falmouth (Black).
- Girls trousers Trutex GTN (2 pocket black)/David Luke DL965 black).
- Skirts Blue Tartan and knee length
- Trutex Senior stitched down/Taylor Tartan (blue) skirt and may be worn no more than 2" above the knee. Knee length black tailored shorts may be worn.
- Black sturdy shoes or all black trainers.
- White socks or black tights with skirts.
- Clyst Vale reversible jacket or other outdoor coat.

All uniform and PE Kit can be purchased from Thomas Moore, Exeter. Thomas Moore offers both a personal service in their shop and also the opportunity to order on line at www.thomasmooretoymaster.co.uk

- Eyebrow jewellery, facial, tongue, nose and lip studs are not permitted.
- Leather jackets, all denim garments and all hoodies are not permitted.
- Hats should not be worn indoors.
- Outer coats should be predominantly plain in colour and without large logos.
- A plain white t-shirt or vest may be worn under the shirt.
- On health and safety grounds, shoes should be appropriate for a work place. Flipflops, open toes, Uggs, Dr Martens (or equivalent) are not permitted.
- Jewellery may be worn, providing it is not excessive or potentially hazardous. However, it is a legal requirement that all jewellery must be removed before undertaking sporting activities. It is the responsibility of the wearer to do this.

The Principal, in consultation with the Governors of the College, will decide on the suitability of the appearance of a student attending the College - extreme hair styles, of either cut or colour, are not permitted.
