### **Environment-Themed Newsletter!**

### 1. Severe Weather

Yesterday was particularly unpleasant with heavy rain and flooding. Our catchment is such that generally transport in and out of Exeter is usually manageable, but students and staff in rural areas face more challenges. As it happened, I believe that everyone reached home safely, although a number of my colleagues took three times the normal journey time. By this morning, other than one or two notorious spots like the Station Road fords, coaches could easily navigate the puddles. Again, worth mentioning that in the event of a school closure, this will be communicated via the website, DCC school closure website, and local radio; and that if school transport deliver students in the morning they are contractually obliged to get them home again (this does not apply to Stagecoach). We didn't escape unscathed, by the way: although students were not really affected, the wind and rain has knocked out the electricity supply to the Finance department and staffroom, which must be a sign it's time to break up.

# 2. Attenborough's Army

On the website "rolling news" you will see that our environment task force planted more than thirty trees on the Community Farm. The Army is a small group of unsung heroes who work on "greening" the site and other environmental activities. This has included litter picks, and most visibly the management of the grassed area by the old playground, including a bug house (or more accurately a bug mansion: it's pretty large).

# 3. Climate & Environment Advisory Group

On Monday I met with a group of the most active, passionate and knowledgeable students to discuss how from a student perspective we can improve climate and environment knowledge, as well as reduce Clyst Vale's own carbon footprint. As a teacher it is always disconcerting, but also a source of immense pride, when students know more than you do, and not wishing to sound patronising, I was hugely impressed by the group's grasp of a wide range of major environmental issues from beach cleans to the latest COP25 conference to developing countries' reliance on fossil fuels to the IPCC report on climate.

The group will meet again in January to reduce the huge list of possible priorities into a manageable plan. It is very challenging but thereby very exciting: reduction in plastics, more greening of the site, looking into grants, tackling the College's waste management, looking at energy-saving initiatives, plus reviewing the curriculum to ensure that we are doing justice to arguably the most important issue facing our students when they become adults and have children of their own.

# 4. Cranbrook Country Park

In the New Year I will be meeting the new Ranger to discuss how Clyst Vale and the Park can work together, gain the opinions of Cranbrook-based Clyst Vale students, and possibly develop some curriculum activities.

### Save the Children

Also mentioned on the rolling news, but well done to our Sixth Formers, who raised over £66 through Christmas Jumper day last Friday.

# **Hearing Support Centre**

We received an audit from Devon County Council earlier this month ("audit" is a euphemism for miniinspection). I'm pleased to say that we passed with flying colours, and Ofsted's opinion that our provision for hearing-impaired students is good was duly confirmed. So, well done to Mrs Angell and Mrs Manaton in particular, but also to all colleagues who teach our HI students, as they are almost entirely integrated into normal lessons. Our HSC is now in fact a MSH (Multi-Sensory Hub), catering for students with sensory impairment. This will make little practical difference for some years, as hearing-impairment comes under the broader definition of sensory impairment.

# **Staff Changes**

Leaving us at the end of this term is Mr Chris Jones, who has secured a promotion to be Head of Geography at his old school, Plympton Academy. Mr Gareth Kerrigan, formerly a maternity replacement, has been appointed to Clyst Vale's staff. The vacancy created will be filled by Mr Simon Fox, until Mrs Zoe Kampfler-Hall returns from maternity leave. Also joining our staff in January will be cover supervisor Mrs Kathryn Arthur and caretaker Mr Andy White.

# **Internet Safety**

As Christmas approaches, many students will be receiving new and exciting internet enabled devices and gadgets. In a recent Newsletter I put various links to organisations if you have concerns about internet use or safety, so I won't repeat them again. However, the first piece of preventive advice these organisations all have in common is that being aware and promoting an ongoing openness and dialogue within your family is the best possible way for you to keep your child or children safe.

# Attendance, Absence and **Requests for Absence**

Please let the College know of any absence on the first day it occurs.

If the absence continues beyond the first day, please contact the College on each subsequent day of absence, too. To comply with safeguarding obligations, we cannot simply assume a student's sickness absence is ongoing; we need to be certain that the reason for absence is due to continuing illness.

If you do not notify the College, then we will make contact with you to identify the reason for absence. This is important as it helps to reduce unauthorised absences and truancy.

Please note, the College may ask you to provide medical proof if a student is absent from College due to illness.

### Medical appointments:

We encourage students to maximise their levels of attendance; research indicates a direct link between attendance and examination performance.

The timing of many medical appointments means that often students can attend school first, and return afterwards. By doing so, students minimise missed learning whilst keeping their attendance levels as high as possible. Therefore, we ask that parents/carers send their child into school for morning registration, even when a medical appointment takes place in the middle of the morning. Similarly, appointments scheduled for the afternoon should, where possible, be arranged after Period 4 - during lunchtime. Students are encouraged to return to school after a lunchtime appointment, if they

# **School Transport**

- 1. Clyst Vale supports the (DCC) Devon County Council's "No Pass No Travel Scheme" that operates on transport to and from this College.
- 2. Only students who show a valid travel pass to the driver **on every journey** will be allowed to travel. Students must travel on the vehicle indicated on their pass.
- 3. Please ensure that your child has their travel pass before they leave home every day.
- 4. Please ensure that your child knows what to do in the event they are not allowed to travel or the bus does not arrive (e.g. because of breakdown or traffic conditions or severe weather). College attendance is very important and it is best to be prepared for any of these eventualities.
- 5. DCC will carry out regular pass checks throughout the year.
- 6. Drivers are not allowed to carry passengers who cannot show a valid pass.
- 7. If your child loses their pass during the day they should go to the AtHoS offices to ask for a 10 day temporary pass. Replacement passes cost £5 each and can be ordered online, or by sending a cheque with a replacement form.

## **COLLEGE DRESS**

Clyst Vale aims to maintain a simple pattern of College dress to promote a clear sense of identity and enable students to come sensibly dressed, at reasonable cost, for a range of learning activities. If a student is improperly dressed, correct uniform will be provided for that day or the student may be sent home to change his/her clothing, at the discretion of the Principal. If parents are in any doubt about the suitability of an item of uniform they should check with the College before buying it.

#### Uniform for all students in Years 7 to 11

- White collared shirt
- School colour tie
- Clyst Vale V-neck jumper with College logo.
- Boys trousers Banner Slimbridge (Black)/Banner Falmouth (Black).
- Girls trousers Trutex GTN (2 pocket black)/David Luke DL965 black).
- All trousers must have Clyst Vale logo rivet on waistband.
- Skirts Blue Tartan and knee length
- Trutex Senior stitched down/Taylor Tartan (blue) skirt and may be worn no more than 2" above the knee. Knee length black tailored shorts may be worn.
- Black sturdy shoes or all black trainers.
- White socks or black tights with skirts.
- Clyst Vale reversible jacket or other outdoor coat.

All uniform and PE Kit can be purchased from Thomas Moore, Exeter. Thomas Moore offers both a personal service in their shop and also the opportunity to order on line at www.thomasmooretoymaster.co.uk.

- Eyebrow jewellery, facial, tongue, nose and lip studs are not permitted.
- Leather jackets, all denim garments and all hoodies are not permitted.
- Hats should not be worn indoors.
- Outer coats should be predominantly plain in colour and without large logos.
- A plain white t-shirt or vest may be worn under the shirt.
- On health and safety grounds, shoes should be appropriate for a work place. Flipflops, open toes, Uggs, Dr Martens (or equivalent) are not permitted.
- Jewellery may be worn, providing it is not excessive or potentially hazardous. However, it is a legal requirement that all jewellery must be removed before undertaking sporting activities. It is the responsibility of the wearer to do this.

The Principal, in consultation with the Governors of the College, will decide on the suitability of the appearance of a student attending the College - extreme hair styles, of either cut or colour, are not permitted.
