League Tables

...or Performance Tables as they are now called. The link to the Gov.UK site is as follows: https:// www.compare-school-performance.service.gov.uk/school/136638. These were published yesterday, relating to the 2017 summer results, and confirm what we knew already. At GCSE our students performed reasonably well, with most attainment measures above both Devon and England, and the official verdict is that we meet the "average" descriptor for Progress 8; clearly, we aspire to improve on this, and are working hard. We knew that A-level results were down in 2017, so it is disappointing but not a surprise that the official verdict is "below average". Again, a lot has been put in place to improve on this, and our internal tracking is revealing a much more positive picture for 2018. Because of the changes to GCSE grading and the introduction of new performance measures, it is not possible to compare the 2017 results to 2016. It's also worth pointing out that the performance table headlines make no allowance for the proportion of students with special needs or other difficulties, which is why special schools are generally at the bottom. Clyst Vale has an inclusive ethos, with a higher-than-average proportion of students with SEN, so this causes a small dent in the headline GCSE figures. Year 11 Parents' Evening

Thank you to parents and carers of Year 11 students for another excellent turn-out on Tuesday: 81% of students were represented, which is a very good and heartening figure. It is a very important evening, positioned just before exam entries, not long after the mocks, but with enough time to turn things round in the way of controlled assessments and exam preparation. As always, most students are well on track, but the evening was a chastening experience for one or two. I've produced the satisfaction scores below based on 42 questionnaires; it's very pleasing to see most of the indicators are 90+% and our reputation as a caring school is being maintained.

Careers

In December, the government launched a new Careers Strategy for schools, which will undoubtedly improve careers provision, if schools can afford to implement it! There is an enhanced emphasis on careers education, more involvement from local businesses ("meaningful employer experiences"), and improved careers information, advice and guidance. A cynic might say that the new Strategy is largely putting back the things which Michael Gove's reforms took out a few years ago, but I think it's very welcome. We have always valued careers education at Clyst Vale, and were already working towards many of the points in the Strategy when it was launched. For example, we have established a strong working relationship with an enterprise adviser, Jo Fellows: there is a useful explanation of this role and a practical demonstration of how this benefited a Clyst Vale student on work experience on this link:

https://inside.devon.gov.uk/news/enterprise-adviser-network/ Another aspect of the Strategy which is already in place is information about apprenticeships; following last week's general assembly, next week 50 students will attend the Apprenticeship Show at Westpoint and 35 Year 10 students will have an apprenticeship day in College. Year 9 Parents will shortly receive a letter from Mrs Bennett (Head of Careers) with a link to a very useful website: CareersPilot/Kudos. This is being introduced to students in Course 42 lessons. Kudos has been around for over 20 years, and is regularly expanded, updated and its navigation improved, so it is well worth a look.

Year 9 Options

This Year's Options process kicked off today with a general assembly outlining the principles and processes. The Options Booklet will be issued on Tuesday or Wednesday next week, and our ever-popular and packed Options Information Evening will be on Tuesday 6th February (students are very welcome to attend, and most do - it's one of the nice evenings when we're helping, and not giving anyone a hard time!). Further discussion is provided for students by an individual mentoring session with their tutor; and further information from an "Options Fair" where Year 9s can chat to Year 10s and 11s about the different subjects. Year 9 students are all individuals, so some will not have thought about options, others will have whittled down to four or five subjects, and at the other extreme one or two will have made up their mind already. Even if a student has made up their mind, our strong advice is to check everything out carefully to guarantee it is a well thought through decision. Linking directly to Careers, Year 9 Parents will shortly receive a letter from Mrs Bennett (Head of Careers) with a link to a very useful website: CareersPilot/Kudos. This is being introduced to students in Course 42 lessons. Kudos has been around for over 20 years, and is regularly expanded, updated and its navigation improved, so it is well worth a look.

Funding

"Devon", in the shape of the County Council and Headteachers' Associations, have been keeping up the pressure on MPs and the Government including a lobbying visit to Parliament. As well as the funding inequalities I mention regularly, concerns going forward are that pay rises for teachers and support staff may be agreed but without additional funding, so this comes from the schools' budgets; that new initiatives should be properly funded, for example the new Careers Strategy will cost schools money, and it would be wonderful for every school to have a mental health champion (proposed in a Government green paper) but this needs time and money which would be another demand the existing budgets; and that schools should be exempt from the 0.5% apprenticeship levy.

Parents sometimes ask what they should write to MPs. It's important to remember that MPs are more influenced by individual letters than a dozen identical "template" letters with different signatures. A letter or e-mail does not have to be very long, either. The following might help as a basis, but please adapt it to individualise it.

Dear MP,

I am concerned about the state of school funding. The national funding formula doesn't appear to be fair to children in Devon schools, and I know that you are already aware of this. I believe that each Devon child is worth £2000 less than in some areas of England, and almost £300 less than the national average. Due to low levels of funding, my child's school has already reduced staff and seen some classes rise in numbers. I am especially concerned about the reductions to special educational needs funding.


As a parent I would like to register my dismay/shock/disappointment/anger at the level of funding being provided to our schools and would ask what you, as my constituency MP, intend to do about this?

School Transport

- 1. Clyst Vale supports the (DCC) Devon County Council's "No Pass No Travel Scheme" that operates on transport to and from this College.
- 2. Only students who show a valid travel pass to the driver **on every journey** will be allowed to travel. Students must travel on the vehicle indicated on their pass.
- 3. Please ensure that your child has their travel pass before they leave home every day.
- 4. Please ensure that your child knows what to do in the event they are not allowed to travel or the bus does not arrive (e.g. because of breakdown or traffic conditions or severe weather). College attendance is very important and it is best to be prepared for any of these eventualities.
- 5. DCC will carry out regular pass checks throughout the year.
- 6. Drivers are not allowed to carry passengers who cannot show a valid pass.
- 7. If your child loses their pass during the day they should go to the AtHoS offices to ask for a 10 day temporary pass. Replacement passes cost £5 each and can be ordered online, or by sending a cheque with a replacement form.

COLLEGE DRESS

Clyst Vale aims to maintain a simple pattern of College dress to promote a clear sense of identity and enable students to come sensibly dressed, at reasonable cost, for a range of learning activities. If a student is improperly dressed, correct uniform will be provided for that day or the student may be sent home to change his/her clothing, at the discretion of the Principal.

If parents are in any doubt about the suitability of an item of uniform they should check with the College before buying it.

Uniform for all Students in Years 7 to 11

- · White collared shirt.
- · School colour tie.
- Clyst Vale V-neck jumper with School colour logo.
- Trousers should be plain, black, formal and full length. This means no jeans, leggings, chinos or any trousers with rivets or studs. Trousers must be worn on the waist.
- Skirts should be plain black, and may be worn just above the knee. Skirts must be A-line or straight, but not stretchy or "skater" style.
- Knee length black tailored shorts may be worn in the summer.
- Black sturdy shoes or all black trainers.
- Clyst Vale reversible jacket or other outdoor coat.

Main uniform, PE kit and reversible jacket can be purchased from Thomas Moore.

- Eyebrow jewellery, facial, tongue, nose and lip studs are not permitted.
- Leather jackets, all denim garments and all hoodies are not permitted.
- · Hats should not be worn indoors.
- Outer coats should be predominantly plain in colour and without large logos.
- A plain white t-shirt or vest may be worn under the shirt.
- On health and safety grounds, shoes should be appropriate for a work place. Flipflops, open toes, Uggs, Dr Martens (or equivalent) are not permitted.
- Jewellery may be worn, providing it is not excessive or potentially hazardous. However, it is a legal requirement that all jewellery must be removed before undertaking sporting activities. It is the responsibility of the wearer to do this.

The Principal, in consultation with the Governors of the College, will decide on the suitability of the appearance of a student attending the College – extreme hair styles, of either cut or colour, are not permitted.
