WorthLess? Campaign

Thank you to parents who have taken the trouble to send in messages of support for my attendance at today's march on 11 Downing Street. Inevitably, there have been one or two criticisms as well. Of course I would much rather be in College – I like Clyst Vale a great deal– but the issue of education funding is much bigger than me, or my school, or my students, and I believe Headteachers should stand up to make their point. At Clyst Vale, we have managed very well financially, and have retained a broad curriculum, many extracurricular activities, and do well to support our vulnerable students. However, teachers are teaching an extra lesson a fortnight; class sizes in some years are bigger than even three years ago; we have fewer teaching assistants; our ICT renewal cycle has been pushed back; and there are many smaller examples. It's not about us, but as an illustration if Clyst Vale (ie Devon) was funded at the national average, we would have an extra £220,000 every year. That could pay for four extra teachers; several education support staff; significant upgrade to ICT; significant site improvement. The WorthLess campaign is not politically motivated, and I completely subscribe to that. Although we are not, some schools are facing financial crisis and we need to stand together. I must add that Clyst Vale's Governors support my action today.

Parents' Information Group (formerly PTFA) A.G.M

This will be held next Wednesday, 3rd October, at 6.30 pm in Post-16. Many apologies for the mix-up over dates in the last Newsletter: the meeting is definitely on Wednesday! The main focus will be a presentation and discussion on the topic of "Pride in Clyst Vale", with much of this centring on the Rights Respecting School initiative. Mrs Battishill, who has been very involved in RRS since we started, will talk about the programme, the award, activities so far, plans for the future, and how this will make things much better for Clyst Vale students in years to come. Year 10 Parents Information Evening, Tuesday 9th October, 6.00

Another date for the diary! It takes the form of a briefing/talk, with an opportunity for general questions and individual questions at the end. There have been significant changes to GCSEs of course, which have knock-on effects on teaching and learning styles. We have now had one run through of the new syllabuses and 9-1 gradings, and there are significant differences from GCSEs even two or three years ago. We look forward to seeing you!

Year 7 Meet the Tutor Evening

Two days later, on Thursday 11th October, is Year 7's "Meet the Tutor" evening. This is an appointment to discuss how well Year 7 students have settled in, to have any queries answered, and to raise any concerns or issues.

Internet Safety

A couple of issues have surfaced recently. In several local schools, including Clyst Vales, there has been a spate of largely younger students sharing inappropriate videos via Instagram. This is a safeguarding issue and the Police have been involved. It's worth remembering that if you are sent any videos and pictures of this nature, they must be deleted and not shared further. It is a criminal offence to share indecent videos.

We've also been warned about an innocent-looking app called DOKI DOKI (Literature Club). It's a free dating app, and it's easy to get past the 13+ age limit. Initially the app is quite light-hearted and fun, but becomes very dark when the online friend talks about depression and eventually commits suicide. Well worth avoiding or deleting.

Behaviour on Buses

By and large, our students are extremely well-behaved on the buses; they are respectful towards the drivers, and sensible. It's great to see how many say "thank you" to the driver when they disembark in the morning. There are sometimes exceptions to this general picture. We do not accept or tolerate messing about on buses, doubly so if it is distracting to the driver or dangerous. Our behaviour policy is clear that we will take appropriate action if students break the rules on buses. Further, the bus companies can also impose temporary and even permanent bans on students. As I said, this last paragraph will be irrelevant to the vast majority of students and parents except for reassurance, and if you have concerns about the bus journey, please let your child's AtHoS know.

Exeter War Hospitals Panels

I'm pleased to say that Mrs Padden has arranged for the Exeter War Hospitals Display Panels to be set up at Clyst Vale for the week beginning ^{1st} October. These generated a lot of interest when they were here before the summer, and we have liaised with Broadclyst Parish Council to publicise them. If you would like to view the panels we have been very fortunate in securing an exhibition on the role that Exeter played in the Great War. Seven hospitals were set up in Exeter. Wounded troops from all over the British Empire were taken by ship from France to Southampton and then by train to Exeter.

The exhibition is on display in our Learning Support Department. Members of the public may see the exhibition for free during the Clyst Vale Library public opening times next Monday (1st October) Wednesday (3rd October) and Thursday (4th October).

On Monday and Wednesday the opening times are 3.30 to 17.30. On Thursday 3.30 to 18.00. Best wishes,





School Transport

- 1. Clyst Vale supports the (DCC) Devon County Council's "No Pass No Travel Scheme" that operates on transport to and from this College.
- 2. Only students who show a valid travel pass to the driver **on every journey** will be allowed to travel. Students must travel on the vehicle indicated on their pass.
- 3. Please ensure that your child has their travel pass before they leave home every day.
- 4. Please ensure that your child knows what to do in the event they are not allowed to travel or the bus does not arrive (e.g. because of breakdown or traffic conditions or severe weather). College attendance is very important and it is best to be prepared for any of these eventualities.
- 5. DCC will carry out regular pass checks throughout the year.
- 6. Drivers are not allowed to carry passengers who cannot show a valid pass.
- 7. If your child loses their pass during the day they should go to the AtHoS offices to ask for a 10 day temporary pass. Replacement passes cost £5 each and can be ordered online, or by sending a cheque with a replacement form.

COLLEGE DRESS FROM SEPTEMBER 2018

Clyst Vale aims to maintain a simple pattern of College dress to promote a clear sense of identity and enable students to come sensibly dressed, at reasonable cost, for a range of learning activities. If a student is improperly dressed, correct uniform will be provided for that day or the student may be sent home to change his/her clothing, at the discretion of the Principal. If parents are in any doubt about the suitability of an item of uniform they should check with the College before buying it.

Uniform for all students in Years 7 to 11

- White collared shirt
- School colour tie
- Clyst Vale V-neck jumper with College logo.
- Boys trousers Banner Slimbridge (Black)/Banner Falmouth (Black).
- Girls trousers Trutex GTN (2 pocket black)/David Luke DL965 black).
- All trousers must have Clyst Vale logo rivet on waistband.
- Skirts Blue Tartan.
- Trutex Senior stitched down/Taylor Tartan (blue) skirt and may be worn no more than 2" above the knee. Knee length black tailored shorts may be worn in the summer.
- Black sturdy shoes or all black trainers.
- White socks or black tights with skirts.
- Clyst Vale reversible jacket or other outdoor coat.

All uniform and PE Kit can be purchased from Thomas Moore, Exeter. Thomas Moore offers both a personal service in their shop and also the opportunity to order on line at www.thomasmooretoymaster.co.uk.

- Eyebrow jewellery, facial, tongue, nose and lip studs are not permitted.
- Leather jackets, all denim garments and all hoodies are not permitted.
- Hats should not be worn indoors.
- Outer coats should be predominantly plain in colour and without large logos.
- A plain white t-shirt or vest may be worn under the shirt.
- On health and safety grounds, shoes should be appropriate for a work place. Flipflops, open toes, Uggs, Dr Martens (or equivalent) are not permitted.
- Jewellery may be worn, providing it is not excessive or potentially hazardous. However, it is a legal requirement that all jewellery must be removed before undertaking sporting activities. It is the responsibility of the wearer to do this.

The Principal, in consultation with the Governors of the College, will decide on the suitability of the appearance of a student attending the College - extreme hair styles, of either cut or colour, are not permitted.
