Terms you need to understand

- **Prejudice=** an unfavorable opinion or feeling formed beforehand or without knowledge, thought, or reason.
- Racism= a belief that inherent differences among the various human racial groups determine cultural or individual achievement, usually involving the idea that one's own race is superior and has the right to dominate others or that a particular racial group is inferior to the others.
- Discrimination= the unjust or prejudicial treatment of different categories of people, especially on the grounds of race, age, or sex.

What's the current situation?

- Protests first erupted on 25 May, after video footage went viral on social media of a white police
 officer in the city of Minneapolis kneeling on the neck of 46-year-old African American George
 Floyd, for more than eight minutes, causing his death while in police custody.
- Over the past week, tens of thousands of demonstrators have since taken to the streets of more than 300 US cities, as well as other large urban centres around the world, to take part in mostly peaceful protesting calling for racial justice, but often chaotic streets have also borne witness to looting, bloodshed and violent policing tactics.
- News reports have revealed unnecessary and disproportionate use of force by law enforcement
 officers. Tear gas, rubber bullets and pepper balls have been fired at peaceful demonstrators and
 journalists, even in some instances, when they were clearly retreating.
- With injuries and deaths sustained by both protesters and police alike, the High Commissioner of Human Rights, Michele Bachelet, repeated her calls to demonstrators to peacefully express their demands for justice, and for the police to "take the utmost care not to enflame the situation".
- "Violence, looting and the destruction of property and neighbourhoods won't solve the problem of police brutality and entrenched discrimination".
- Ms. Bachelet also voiced concern over statements that have labelled protesters as terrorists or delegitimize peaceful demonstrating, saying, "there can be no doubt as to what or who is 'behind' these protests".
- She pointed to the "thousands upon thousands of peaceful protesters" as well as police officers and National Guard troops, who have responded without resorting to violence, and exercised restraint.
