Welcome from the Principal

Safe, happy and successful.

These three words sum up what parents expect from their child's school. Therefore, these major priorities underpin everything we aim to do at Clyst Vale, reflected in this prospectus. Safety is always paramount, and the curriculum, range of extra-curricular activities and other opportunities all contribute to students enjoying their time at Clyst Vale, improving their learning or personal skills, and in most cases both. In this introduction, I highlight a handful of Clyst Vale's particular characteristics.

Visitors to Clyst Vale usually comment on the friendly, orderly atmosphere,

the courtesy of our students, and the purposefulness in lessons. This is fundamental to learning, and does not happen by chance. We have clear expectations and systems, but far more important are the excellent working relationships we establish between staff and students, as well as staff and parents.

Clyst Vale is very successful in academic terms, reflected in above average results in both GCSE and A-level in 2014 and 15, recognised by Ofsted's "good" judgement in 2015. We are also successful in competitions, sport and drama; in developing students' confidence; in supporting students with special educational needs or difficult challenges. This recognition of the individual child is essential to our overall ethos.

We have maintained a very strong commitment to Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) for many years, including as a specialist College. Results are consistently strong in these areas. We have had particular success in the Jaguar Landrover 4x4 competitions,

with two teams in the 2015 World Final. Many Sixth Form students progress to university degrees in the sciences, or with a scientific or mathematical base.

Clyst Vale has a strong community focus. We retain one of the last dual-use libraries in the region, open to the public (as a fully public library) on three days a week. Broadclyst Sports Hall has shared use between Clyst Vale and the community. We contribute to the Local Authority's Hearing Support service, and have strong links with a variety of local organisations and businesses.

We place great importance on partnership with parents. Students attend school for just a quarter of their waking hours per year, so what happens out of school has a major impact on their educational success. We will always aim to work with parents to overcome challenges, and of course we keep parents regularly and fully informed about their children's progress.

The College's Mission

To raise standards of achievement through improvements to teaching and learning.

To provide extensive opportunities for members of the College and wider community to participate and succeed.

To prepare members of the College community for life, and for the next stage of their lives.

To use current and future technology to its maximum effect for the whole community.

Clyst Vale's site has improved dramatically over recent years, most recently with a new building for Science and Humanities. This was the first phase of a three-phase masterplan to transform the site, and we will continue to press for capital funding to fulfil our vision.

From your viewpoint, the right choice of secondary school is a significant decision. This prospectus shows the opportunities available here, and something of our spirit. There is a wealth of current information on our website, www.clystvale.org including our weekly newsletters and news stories. However, to get a true feel of the College, there is no substitute for a visit. If you were unable to attend our Open Evening, Post-16 Open Evening, or organised visits, please contact us to arrange an individual visit where you will see how we ensure the children in our care are safe, happy and successful.

College life

Four Schools, one College

Clyst Vale is one College, structured around four 'Schools'. Each School has the responsibility for the welfare and academic progress of its students. We believe in a holistic, integrated approach to maximise student progress and achievement: an unhappy or worried student does not learn well, but equally we cannot call ourselves 'caring' if students are performing below their potential. Schools will form the basis of in-College competitions, similar to the 'house' system common in English education; however, they will also provide pastoral care, monitor academic performance and lead interventions where necessary. The Clyst Vale 'School' is much more than the modern 'house'!

Each School is led by a Head of School, supported by a team of tutors and a support staff Assistant to Head of School. All members of staff belong to one of the Schools, and a member of the Senior Leadership Team is associated with each School.

Our four Schools are:

Green School, Yellow School, Silver School, Red School.

Classroom expectations - IPC

We expect high levels of commitment from our students, so they can achieve their full potential. We ask students to always remember to be independent learners, purposeful and co-operative in all aspects of their lives and we use these values to monitor and assess student performance in College.

Student Voice

We believe in working with our students. The College and Schools Councils exist to give a voice to the students. Elected representatives from each year group and School meet regularly, and also with the Principal to discuss all aspects of College life and to make recommendations and suggestions. College Council has an executive of four members and Councillors often represent the student body at public events. For example, the Council devised a student questionnaire on bullying, achieved Fairtrade status, advised on the 2013-2014 Build Project, and was consulted on the new uniform for September 2013. The Council also interviews prospective job applicants and regularly discusses teaching and learning issues.

Kenyan partnership

We have established links with Ndururumo High School, a school in Nyahururu, Kenya. This provides our students with a unique and excellent opportunity to experience different cultures and further develop the facilities and curriculum, both in Kenya and here in the UK. Our students will observe the similarities and differences between Kenya and the UK in the upcoming years and many will have the opportunity to experience the Kenyan culture through regular contact, including visits, with our partner school.

Bude residential trip

A major contribution to this is the Year 8 Bude residential trip, where our students gain invaluable experience. In addition, Year 8 students have the opportunity to discover the working world through 'Take Your Child to Work Day' and by spending a day assisting in Clyst Vale's Reception.

Deep Learning Days

On Deep Learning Days students take part in a wide variety of experiences, with a strong emphasis on broadening and enriching the curriculum. These include anything from off site activity days (for example visits to @Bristol, Paignton Zoo and the Globe Theatre), taster GCSE lessons for Year 9s, historical re-enactments and enterprise activities.

Roy Leach from Business Navigators, who has run enterprise activities in schools across the country, was most impressed with our students.

"Year 8 are a really great year of students to work with, everything from their work ethic to their creativity; behaviour to their desire to do well; when working individually and in small teams.

In 10 years of running the programme, I have never seen so many groups practising their presentations. Many of the presentations/presenters were truly excellent, across all mixed abilities, many stood up with an enthusiasm, originality, sense of fun, and delivery well beyond their years.

It was a real pleasure working with all of the teachers and students, who importantly seemed to really enjoy the day and we had a bit of fun and laughter along the way as well!"

Making choices

Discovering the next stage of their journey through the College is exciting and many Year 9 students start taking on leadership responsibilities, through mentoring Year 6 students on Intake Days to starting leadership courses in PE.

Students also choose their GCSE subjects this year. We recognise that this is an incredibly important decision and therefore Clyst Vale offers a raft of information and support to allow students to make the most informed choice about their future.

This includes:

- A comprehensive options handbook
- An options evening
- A further options fair
- An individual interview with each student

In addition to the Core GCSE Curriculum which includes:

- English
- Mathematics
- Science
- Beliefs and Values (full GCSE)

Students will also study non-GCSE courses in:

- PE
- Course 42 (which covers personal social and health education)
- Careers Education and Work - Related Learning

Students also then choose from the additional options listed below.

Throughout this process students receive all the advice, support and encouragement they need to plan a successful future for themselves.

Becoming leaders

Starting their GCSEs is exceptionally important. Students develop an understanding of subjects in more depth and can link their studies to the wider community and beyond.

However, students are offered many more opportunities in addition to their chosen subjects, including the option of gaining nationally recognised leadership awards and qualifications. These help students develop essential life skills, such as organisation, motivation, communication and working with others.

We want to inspire our students to think of their future careers, therefore students take part in various events including a work preparation day and their week of work experience. This is their opportunity to use all the skills learnt over the last four years during different career workshops and events to secure

a placement in an environment in which they are interested.

Students are encouraged to work with employers, learn from them, and develop the skills and attributes required to be successful.

Duke of Edinburgh's Award

Here at Clyst Vale we offer students the chance of completing all levels of the Duke of Edinburgh's Award, from Bronze up to Gold (many state schools only offer one level of the award).

An impressive proportion of our students choose to take part in the award, even when compared with many independent schools where D of E is often part of the curriculum. It's a fantastic award, too - although the expedition element grabs the attention, there are three other components of volunteering, developing and using a skill, and physical activity. The Gold Award has a fifth element - residential trip.

Expeditions are based in East Devon (Bronze), the South West Coast Path in West Dorset (Silver), Dartmoor (Gold practice) and the Brecon Beacons or sometimes the Mountains of Mourne in Ireland (Gold).

4X4 Challenge National Champions

Clyst Vale has achieved great success in this competition, which has inspired team members and other students to look into engineering as a possible future career. Two Clyst Vale teams represented the UK at the very first World Finals.

- 2013 Regional & National Class 2 Champions
- 2014 Regional & National Champions
- 2015 Regional & Nationals Champions (1st Team)
- 2015 Regional Class 2 and 3rd placed Nationally (2nd Team)
- 2015 World Finalists finishing in 2nd (Clystians Team) and 10th positions (Supacat Team).

The Jaguar Land Rover 4x4 in Schools Technology Challenge is an international challenge for young people aged 11 – 19 years old. The challenge involves 4 to 6 team members working together within defined specifications to design and build a radio controlled 4-wheel-drive (4x4) vehicle. The vehicle must successfully negotiate a specially designed test track which emulates real life and what a full scale 4x4 vehicle can do. The challenge is an excellent opportunity for young people to work in teams and gain an awareness and understanding of project management using key skills. Students are assessed on their design, driving skills, engineering knowledge, team presentation to the judges, “pit stop” display, and portfolio.

Support from a range of local companies has been invaluable in the success of the two teams, who have learned much about developments in technology and application of industrial manufacturing techniques. Clearly, the aim is to maintain the College’s successful reputation, raise student aspiration, and continue to forge strong industrial links.
