Dear Parents and Carers,

Open Evening

Last night's Open Evening was very busy again, standing room only, and as usual a fantastic showcase of what we are and what we do. It's a Headteacher's dream to describe their school as "popular and over-subscribed". Thank you to all parents who loaned us your children yesterday evening as tour guides, demonstrators and helpers (and picked them up again at the end). Our students are incredibly knowledgeable about Clyst Vale, showing their loyalty and sense of belonging, and demonstrated more about Clyst Vale and its values than any polished power point or glossy brochure.

Open Week Next Week

Similar to the Open Evening, the daily tours next week are looking very busy indeed. Students will again do the guiding and answering the bulk of the questions, with senior staff available for Q-and-A at the end. And it's a useful addition to the Open Evening: any school can put on a show for one evening, but you can't judge the atmosphere during the daytime without visiting in the daytime.

Y11 Revision Evening, 9th October

Year 11 parents should have received a letter about this, but just in case....On 9th October we are holding a Parents' Information Evening about revision. We'll outline our overall revision plan for year 11 students, designed to support and guide students through revision across all subjects until it's GCSE time in May. Parents will see what is on offer to support students here at Clyst Vale: the structured revision programmes and support materials available, including how to access them. Duke of Edinburgh's Award

We are pleased to say that 51 Year 9 students have signed up to complete their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh's Award! Our first training session will be on Monday 25th September when we will go through how the students upload their evidence on to the eDofE platform. Our second training session will be on Monday 2nd



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October when we will be going through essential first aid skills, the kit required for the expeditions and how to pack a rucksack. Both of these sessions will run from 1.30pm until 2.10pm in IT4. All relevant information will be loaded on to the Bronze file on Teams.

We will also be running a training session on Tuesday 26th October, in IT4, to help our Silver and Gold students to enrol on to eDofE. We also hope to take our year 12 Gold participants on a training walk on Dartmoor on Saturday 30th September to support them with their navigation skills (dependent upon student numbers). The Big Ambition: Children and Young People's On-line Survey

Next Thursday, the Children's Commissioner for England Rachel de Souza will be visiting Devon as part of her launch of The Big Ambition. The Big Ambition is a survey for all children aged 6-18 and parents of young people aged 0-18 across the country. She hopes to use the survey to hear about what children want for the future, their hopes, dreams, and aspirations. With a General Election not far away, now is a great time for politicians and policy makers to hear children's and young people's voices.

Attendance

Further to my comments last week, I can now share the highlights from the letter to Headteachers from Chris Whitty the Chief Medical Officer on behalf of the Department for Education.

"Dear headteachers and trust leaders,

We are aware that the COVID-19 pandemic may have caused some parents to feel less confident with assessing whether their child is well enough to be in school so we have laid out some information which we hope you will find helpful.

There is wide agreement among health professionals and educational professionals that school attendance is vital to the life chances of children and young people. Being in school improves health, wellbeing and socialisation throughout the life course. The greatest benefits come from children and young people attending school regularly.

It is usually appropriate for parents and carers to send their children to school with mild respiratory illnesses. This would include general cold symptoms: a minor cough, runny nose or sore throat. However, children should not be sent to school if they have a temperature of 38°C or above. Refer to NHS 'Is my child too ill for school?' guidance

We are aware that more children may be absent from school due to symptoms of anxiety than before the pandemic. Worry and mild or moderate anxiety, are a normal part of growing up for many children and young people. Being in school can often help alleviate the underlying issues. A prolonged period of absence is likely to heighten a child's anxiety, rather than reduce it. DfE has published useful guidance on mental health issues affecting a pupil's attendance. The Royal College of General Practitioners (RCGP) recently approved 5 principles to promote school attendance to support GPs in having sensitive and reassuring conversations with parents, carers and pupils.



The second half was dominated by the visitors, with Clyst Vale struggling to make inroads to the St Peters defence, despite some strong carries and runs by Dan Baker, JJ

Attendance, Absence and Requests for Absence

Please let the College know of any absence on the first day it occurs.

If the absence continues beyond the first day, please contact the College on each subsequent day of absence, too. To comply with safeguarding obligations, we cannot simply assume a student's sickness absence is ongoing; we need to be certain that the reason for absence is due to continuing illness.

If you do not notify the College, then we will make contact with you to identify the reason for absence. This is important as it helps to reduce unauthorised absences and truancy.

Please note, the College may ask you to provide medical proof if a student is absent from College due to illness.

Medical Appointments

We encourage students to maximise their levels of attendance; research indicates a direct link between attendance and examination performance. The timing of many medical appointments means that often students can attend school first, and return afterwards. By doing so, students minimise missed learning whilst keeping their attendance levels as high as possible. Therefore, we ask that parents/carers send their child into school for morning registration, even when a medical appointment takes place in the middle of the morning. Similarly, appointments scheduled for the afternoon should, where possible, be arranged after Period 4 - during lunchtime. Students are encouraged to return to school after a lunchtime appointment, if they can.

Thank you for your support in helping your child maximise their attendance and learning.


