The Open Evening

Harry Patch Day

Thank you to Mrs Padden, the Sixth Form, and an enthusiastic group of Year 9 students, Harry Patch Day was commemorated and even better raised just over £180 for UNICEF's fund for children in Ukraine.

Food and Catering

The Head Students had a very good meeting to discuss CleverChefs' first three weeks and provide student feedback. Clearly, our new caterers are new, so there was always going to be some change (quite a lot of teenagers don't like change, especially the move away from pizza every day without fail, but they do adapt eventually), there would inevitably be some teething problems, and this is against a cost-of-living challenge.

CleverChefs run on a three-week menus cycle, monitor closely what is sold, so will have a better amount and range of food next week as "Week One" repeats. This means that vegetarian options should not run out so quickly (the vegetarian bagels were very popular with the carnivores as well). Most student feedback is that the quality of food has improved, which is good news. CleverChefs will respond next week to issues over the price of bottled water, reducing 330cl to 50p and introducing 500cl at £1. Students have noted positively that there is significantly less food waste than before (the account checker has helped with this). Updated posters will appear next week. "Meal deals" will be introduced in the Giraffe House "Grab and Go" service. Some students have not been buying certain items like bao buns or quesadilla because of unfamiliarity, so tasters will also be started. A bit of salad to add to a meal will be free (doesn't apply to prepared salad pots). Also starting next week as a trial for the breakfast service is free porridge; this is for any student who wishes to partake.

Cost of Living: Trips and Visits

I mentioned this last year. It's tricky, and we're all well aware from the media that schools, especially primaries, are reducing the number of trips and visits. I completely understand why against the economic background which despite government intervention is quite likely to be tough for the near future: some trips are quite expensive, especially abroad and/or residential; sometimes the initial deposits required by the tour company are a lot in one lump, even if the total cost is manageable over a period; depending on the number and age of children, there can be issues of fairness; trips sound exciting, so there is a disappointment factor.

However, we have decided that we will continue to offer trips and visits, cautiously. We do not want to put unnecessary pressure on families. On the other hand, schools are places of education, trips are educational, and also provide opportunities for enrichment and development (and memories).

Stagecoach: Every September....

A different sort of educational journey. Every September conkers fall from the tree, and every September we have teething problems with Stagecoach buses. This is not ok, as children as young as 11 are late, anxious and - now and again - stranded. We have an arrangement with Stagecoach that any student using public transport has no need to go to a public bus stop for reasons of safety. Three buses to Exeter and one bus to Tiverton are supposed to come into the coach park so the pick-up is supervised and there is no need to walk on roads without pavements. We all understand that buses get delayed, and the Westclyst roadworks are a nightmare. We have always enjoyed pretty good relationships with Stagecoach. We will always register a complaint with Stagecoach when students are put at a minor risk; however, it would be really helpful if parents could do as well.

If your child is stuck at school, or with no phone or no battery, they should find an adult. Reception is usually open until 4.30 pm and there are staff on site later than that. We can make calls, contact parents, and find some way for the child to get home safely !

Good news for parents is that Newsletters following big events on a Thursday are generally shorter. After Monday's bank holiday for the Queen's funeral, it's been a pretty good week, and certainly some of the settling-in pains in the first couple of weeks have now gone.

Attendance, Absence and Requests for Absence

Please let the College know of any absence on the first day it occurs. If the absence continues beyond the first day, please contact the College on each subsequent day of absence, too. To comply with safeguarding obligations, we cannot simply assume a student's sickness absence is ongoing; we need to be certain that the reason for absence is due to continuing illness.

If you do not notify the College, then we will make contact with you to identify the reason for absence. This is important as it helps to reduce unauthorised absences and truancy.

Please note, the College may ask you to provide medical proof if a student is absent from College due to illness.

Medical Appointments

We encourage students to maximise their levels of attendance; research indicates a direct link between attendance and examination performance. The timing of many medical appointments means that often students can attend school first, and return afterwards. By doing so, students minimise missed learning whilst keeping their attendance levels as high as possible. Therefore, we ask that parents/carers send their child into school for morning registration, even when a medical appointment takes place in the middle of the morning. Similarly, appointments scheduled for the afternoon should, where possible, be arranged after Period 4 - during lunchtime. Students are encouraged to return to school after a lunchtime appointment, if they can.

Thank you for your support in helping your child maximise their attendance and learning.

COLLEGE DRESS

Clyst Vale aims to maintain a simple pattern of College dress to promote a clear sense of identity and enable students to come sensibly dressed, at reasonable cost, for a range of learning activities. If a student is improperly dressed, correct uniform will be provided for that day or the student may be sent home to change his/her clothing, at the discretion of the Principal. **If parents are in any doubt about the suitability of an item of uniform they should check with the College before buying it.**

Uniform for all students in Years 7 to 11

- White collared shirt
- School colour tie
- Clyst Vale V-neck jumper with College logo.
- Boys trousers Banner Slimbridge (Black)/Banner Falmouth (Black).
- Girls trousers Trutex GTN (2 pocket black)/David Luke DL965 black).
- Skirts Blue Tartan and knee length
- Trutex Senior stitched down/Taylor Tartan (blue) skirt and may be worn no more than 2" above the knee. Knee length black tailored shorts may be worn.
- Black sturdy shoes or **all black** trainers.
- White socks or black tights with skirts.
- Clyst Vale reversible jacket or other outdoor coat.

- Eyebrow jewellery, facial, tongue, nose and lip studs are not permitted.
- Leather jackets, all denim garments and all hoodies are not permitted.
- Hats should not be worn indoors.
- Outer coats should be predominantly plain in colour and without large logos.
- A plain white t-shirt or vest may be worn under the shirt.
- On health and safety grounds, shoes should be appropriate for a work place. Flipflops, open toes, Uggs, Dr Martens (or equivalent) are not permitted.
- Jewellery may be worn, providing it is not excessive or potentially hazardous. However, it is a legal requirement that all jewellery must be removed before undertaking sporting activities. It is the responsibility of the wearer to do this.

The Principal, in consultation with the Governors of the College, will decide on the suitability of the appearance of a student attending the College - extreme hair styles, of either cut or colour, are not permitted.
