## News from Post 16, Student Achievements and Key Dates



## Year 7 Parents' Evening 16th May 2024



We are pleased to inform you that you will shortly be able to book an appointment with subject teachers to discuss your child's academic progress. Meetings with teachers are held virtually and accessible through cvcc.schoolicloud.co.uk. If you would like an appointment please book this using our online system, if you require any support please contact Pam Grant, Student Services Co-Ordinator, studentservices@clystvale.org or 01392 463910. Please note you will notified that you are able to make an appointment via email, please do not attempt to book before this time as you will not be able to do so. There is an option for more than one parent to virtually join the same meeting, this has been very successful. Some Year 7 teachers have more than one class and slots can be limited, so please be mindful of not booking the same teacher for more than one subject. Meeting slots are for 5 minutes.

## **Mobile Phones**

Please can you remind your child/ children that mobile phones are not allowed to be used on the College grounds. Before students come through the gates their phones must be turned off and stored in their bags. When leaving the College at the end of the day, they cannot use their phones until they are again through the gates. Children seen using their phones on site will have their phones confiscated. If this is at the end of the day, they will be confiscated the following school day for the mobile phone policy to be actioned.

First confiscation- the student will be able to pick the mobile phone up from Student Services.

Second confiscation- the parent/ guardian will be required to come to reception to collect the phone from Student Services.

Third confiscation- the parent/ guardian while be invited to attend a meeting with the relevant Head of Year and discuss the length of the mobile phone ban.

## **Reporting an Absence**

Parents are expected to inform us of their child's absence before 9.00 a.m. on each day of absence providing the reason for absence. If the absence continues beyond the first day, please contact the College on each subsequent day of absence, too. To comply with safeguarding obligations, we cannot simply assume a student's sickness absence is ongoing; we need to be certain that the reason for absence is due to continuing illness. If you do not notify the College, then we will make contact with you to identify the reason for absence. This is important as it helps to reduce unauthorised absences and truancy. In addition, the College may ask you to provide medical proof if your child is absent from College due to illness.

#### Lateness

The school day (first registration session) starts at 8.50 am, all students are expected to be in their classroom at this time.


## **Medical Appointments**

We encourage students to maximise their levels of attendance; research indicates a direct link between attendance and examination performance. The timing of many medical appointments means that often students can attend school first and return afterwards. By doing so, students minimise missed learning whilst keeping their attendance levels as high as possible. We ask that parents/carers send their child into school for morning registration, even when a medical appointment takes place in the middle of the morning. Similarly, appointments scheduled for the afternoon should, where possible, be arranged after Period 4 - during lunchtime. Students are encouraged to return to school after a lunchtime appointment if they can.

Please give the school as much notice as possible, at least two weeks' notice is useful.

If the appointment requires the pupil to leave during the day, they must be signed out by an adult listed on the student's record at the main reception.

## **Poppy Playtime**

It is important that you are aware that whilst the name and characters suggest a playful game, it is a survival horror game with graphics that may not be suitable for your child. It includes characters such as 'Kissy Wissy' and 'Huggy Wuggy.' Please view this game before allowing your child to play it as it may not be appropriate for them – particularly young children.

Children may be playing the game or just watching videos of it on sites such as YouTube or playing replicated versions on Roblox for example.

## Cyberbullying

#### What is cyberbullying?

Cyberbullying is bullying online and can take many forms such as sending malicious messages, leaving nasty comments, excluding somebody from a group chat, blackmailing or setting up a fake profile. Cyberbullying can



take place across many different platforms such as WhatsApp, Snapchat and on games such as Roblox and Minecraft.

#### What should I do if my child is being bullied online?

If your child is being bullied, then try to stay calm and let them know that it is not their fault. It is always useful to keep evidence of any online bullying and inform their school so that they are aware. Show your child how to block and/or report any users/content and review their privacy settings to limit what others can see. You may also wish to set up any parental controls that are available.

## Group Chats

Group Chats are available on various messaging apps, social media apps and in some games. When your child is part of these groups, they may not know all the other members and it may even include people that they have previously blocked. Your child may come across inappropriate content and bullying can take place within these groups. Talk to your child about how they speak to others online and encourage them to talk to people online with kindness, like they would if they were face-to-face. ## TikTok

#### You must be over 13 years of age to use TikTok.

TikTok is a social media platform for sharing and watching short video clips. Some of the videos may not be appropriate for your child to view and there is also the risk of strangers contacting your child. If your child is using TikTok then make sure appropriate security/privacy settings are applied.

#### Account set up

As always, it is important that when setting up an account, your child enters their real date of birth as accounts are tailored by age e.g., direct Messaging is disabled for accounts aged 13-15. In addition, advertisements are tailored to their age. By default, accounts for people under 16 are set to private and we would recommend keeping it as this. This means your child must approve follower requests. #### Family Pairing

#### Inappropriate content, themes and challenges on TikTok

Whilst against TikTok's guidelines, explicit and inappropriate content can be found on this platform, for example nudity/sexual content and hate speech. We often see viral challenges on social media, some of which can be dangerous. If your child is using TikTok, chat to them regularly about what they are viewing.

#### Trends and Influencers

We often see trends on social media, for example a latest trend found is around skin care routines, which can lead to children purchasing products that are completely unsuitable/dangerous for their skin. #### Stranger contact

Talk to your child about who is following them online and ensure that they understand that people may not be who they say they are when online. It is important that children know not to share personal information.

#### Blocking and Reporting

Ensure your child knows how to use the safety features available to them, including how to report comments, direct messages and another user.

## **Online Challenges**

Our children may not have developed the skills and ability to critically analyse all situations yet so **it is important to talk to your child about hoaxes and challenges** that may appear on the internet. Some challenges are fun and provide no risk, **however there will be challenges that are risky/dangerous**. Your child may see others complete certain challenges online without being harmed and therefore may want to repeat them and not consider the potential risks to themselves. Make sure they know that they should talk to you (or another trusted adult) about what they see online, particularly if they plan to try a challenge.

We would always advise that if your child has not heard about an online challenge, then do not draw attention to it as this may lead to them searching for it out of curiosity, so just talk about challenges in a general sense. Furthermore, reassure your child that challenges that suggest that terrible things will happen if they do not complete the tasks are not real.

In 2024 Easter Sunday is on 31 March. The week leading up to Easter is called Holy Week.


