Year 8 Boys Rugby @ Howden Rosslyn Park National Schools 7s:

Congratulations to the Year 8 lads who took their two-year unbeaten record for the school side to the prestigious event in London on Friday, to participate in the U13 Junior Festival and ended up with a playing record of two wins and three losses, overall.

The boys met after school on Thursday for an evening drive to the capital and, after an overnight stay, were placed in Group K of the competition against 4 other schools. We made an outstanding start with two wins from two against Dunottar School (25-20) and Bournemouth Collegiate School (35-5). These performances were a huge squad effort with the hard pitches causing several issues for players with the lads working really well as a side and continuing to hone their 7-a-side skills by keeping the ball alive and finding space and feeding our fast players to go across for several scores. Key scores from Sonny Mackie, Cian Doyle, Harry Crispin, J and Charlie Norman in these games along with the power from Max Hookway and Oliver Payne gave us several opportunities to be competitive throughout. Key contributions to the games with link plays and defensive work came from Ruben Tuley, Jack David, Leo Hoare, Jackson Gallagher, Oliver Marshall, Josh Farmer, Henry Taylor and Will Watkins, really underlining the collective effort and strength of the squad.

After placing ourselves at the top of the group, we faced Emirates Falcon International School from Dubai, also unbeaten. These were a very strong side, with physicality, skill, speed and organisation being like nothing else the lads have faced before. After falling to three early scores, the lads rallied to score twice before the break to rattle the opposition, however we suffered key injuries to try scorers Joe Gibson and Charlie Norman and we suffered after the break with several scores conceded to lost 10-40.

As the day wore on, the lads really had to dig deep in terms of energy stores and the penultimate game against Eltham College was tough with a 0-30 loss with us targeting a big last performance of the day against Aylesbury Grammar School. The lads certainly did not disappoint with a improved performance and gained an excellent score from Sonny Mackie in the corner which we much deserved, however ultimately a defeat of 5-35.

The competition was a culmination of the outstanding efforts and strengths that the boys have shown since starting with us in Year 7. Their attitude and respect of one another and others around them was outstanding both on and off the field and they were impeccable representatives of the College on the national stage.

A big thanks must go to Marc Dibble (Exeter Chiefs) for accompanying Mr Pearce on the trip and to the several parents who drove up and back on the day to the event to support, including Mrs Farmer for the photography.



Learn2Live

We would like to pass on a huge thank you to Chris Boston & Tony Heywood (both of Devon & Somerset Fire Service) and Ian Harvey (Devon & Cornwall Police) who visited Post 16 last Wednesday to deliver a Learn2Live session.

This is a road safety session, specifically tailored to the Post 16 age group - many of whom are newly qualified drivers, learning to drive or planning driving lessons. A lot of our students also travel as passengers in cars with young drivers.

The session highlights the possible hazards young drivers encounter, including looking at how alcohol and drugs alter awareness and should never be considered safe when driving. Strategies for encouraging good driving behaviours in the driver, even when you are a passenger, as well as exiting situations where you feel uncomfortable or unsafe as a passenger, were also discussed.

Between them, Chris, Tony and Ian have decades of experience at the sharp end of dealing with the outcomes of unsafe driving practices; they are consequently passionate about ensuring young drivers are aware of the risks. The session was interesting, engaging – and even humorous at times. These are timely and important messages and we are grateful to the Police and Fire Service for spending time with our students to put the point across in a way that was relevant, impactful and involving. We are confident that all our students will be safer drivers and more alert passengers as a result.

Post 16 events

Environmental Science students enjoyed an excellent fieldwork visit to Stover Park last Tuesday, where they spent the day investigating biodiversity and looking at the park's pollution remediation scheme in action. They were able to apply fieldwork and data collection techniques, which involved wading in streams to collect water samples.

Last Thursday's trip to see Hamlet, attend Shakespeare workshops and absorb the culture of Stratford-upon-Avon was a roaring success and our students (both Post 16 and Y11 & Y10) were outstanding ambassadors for the school. There is a full account with pictures on the next page!

Hamlet - Stratford upon Avon visit, Thursday 27th March 2025

As we approached Stratford-upon-Avon, the skies were clear and blue, the sun shone, and the spring blossoms were in riot all around us. As picture postcards go, this one was just about perfect! Our friendly coach drivers suggested a very brief detour from our planned route, via the cottage that once belonged to Anne Hathaway (Shakespeare's wife). We paused briefly to snap some photos and enjoy the view of the pretty medieval farmhouse with its rolling lawns.

The banks of the River Avon seemed the ideal spot for a picnic lunch, where 'The Shakespeare Man' added to the ambience by reciting sections of the Bard's works, all learned by heart.

After lunch, we made our way to the next destination, Hall's Croft, through the quaint Stratford streets. Here, GCSE students stopped off whilst A-level students continued on to Harvard House. The two groups spent the next hour and a half engaged in a Romeo and Juliet workshop or an Othello set text talk – both of which were excellent.

Shakespeare's Birthplace was our next rendez-vous point, where we toured the exhibition (several students enjoyed the costume props and quote booth) before entering the beautifully preserved house. The guides were full of surprising and interesting facts - not least that the Elizabethans slept sitting up, as they believed that lying flat invited death! (Open fires in the bedrooms meant this was probably not quite as fanciful as it sounds...)

Students next broke off into smaller groups, to explore the historic town some more and hunt down some dinner – meeting back at the theatre ready for the evening performance of Hamlet.

The production was exceptional, with Luke Thallon entirely engrossing in the lead role. Somehow, there were even some humorous moments – until everyone died at the end. Which was always inevitable.

Returning to base shortly before 2am due to an M5 closure did little to dampen everyone's spirits, with all the students thanking group leaders as they left the coach, which was much appreciated.

Although the original trip was rescheduled due to November's snow day, and it felt disappointing at the time, this might have been a blessing in disguise – ultimately, the visit could not have been better. Thank you to the English team for making such a memorable day possible. This was an outstanding trip with so much to absorb, learn and enjoy.

Attendance, Absence and Requests for Absence

Reporting an Absence

Parents are expected to inform us of their child's absence before 9.00 a.m. on each day of absence providing the reason for absence. If the absence continues beyond the first day, please contact the College on each subsequent day of absence, too. To comply with safeguarding obligations, we cannot simply assume a student's sickness absence is ongoing; we need to be certain that the reason for absence is due to continuing illness. If you do not notify the College, then we will make contact with you to identify the reason for absence. This is important as it helps to reduce unauthorised absences and truancy. In addition, the College may ask you to provide medical proof if your child is absent from College due to illness.

Lateness

The school day (first registration session) starts at 8.50 am, all students are expected to be in their classroom at this time.


Medical Appointments

We encourage students to maximise their levels of attendance; research indicates a direct link between attendance and examination performance. The timing of many medical appointments means that often students can attend school first and return afterwards. By doing so, students minimise missed learning whilst keeping their attendance levels as high as possible. We ask that parents/carers send their child into school for morning registration, even when a medical appointment takes place in the middle of the morning. Similarly, appointments scheduled for the afternoon should, where possible, be arranged after Period 4 - during lunchtime. Students are encouraged to return to school after a lunchtime appointment if they can.

Please give the school as much notice as possible, at least two weeks' notice is useful.

If the appointment requires the pupil to leave during the day, they must be signed out by an adult listed on the student's record at the main reception.




